## ASHLAND WILL MARK PIONEER DAYS JULY 4TH

### Centennial of First Overland Trip From Mid-West to Oregon Motif in Big Celebration.

Ashland will commemorate the centennial anniversary of the first overland trek from the middle west to Oregon in 1830 the week of June 29-July 4 in a revival of hardy, frontier scenes.

Days of '49 will be featured in the parade on the morning of July 4 in which the Craters of Medford have been invited to participate. The covered wagon, sourdough miners, prospectors, and famous characters of the wild, primitive life of southern Oregon and northern California will be presented in floats and by marchers. Window displays will contain exhibits of old furniture, prints, antiques gathered by Pioneer Descendants' association from the Applegates, Dunns, Helmans, Russells, Hills and other historic families.

Concerts by the Dunsuir and Ashland bands and an orchestra, with day and night dancing in Lithia park, archery, tennis, and horseshoe tournaments, motorcycle hill climb, old fiddlers' contest, novelty children's races will be high lights of an interesting program. The Crater Lake Motorcycle club of Medford will participate in the hill climb. Prizes are offered in all competitive sports events.

The patriotic exercises under auspices of the Daughters of the American Revolution will follow the community picnic dinner in beautiful, cool Lithia park. "Carnival features will be given by the Steffens Superior Shows of Oakland-Carousel, giant ferris wheel, kiddie rides, riding ponies, the whip, rifle range, athletic stadium.

At 9:00 p. m. there will be a spectacular display of fireworks. The celebration is under the auspices of the Greater Ashland Fourth of July Organization, composed of the commercial, civic and service bodies of Ashland.

## MOULTON WINS IN ALIEN FISH TEST

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Arthur I. Moulton, lawyer, who filed a test case in district court against E. M. Croisan, federal collector of customs, for 66 cents collected as import duty on salmon caught behind the three mile limit, today said the treasury ruling deciding fish caught by alien residents may be brought into this country free was a victory for many Pacific coast fishermen.

A month ago Moulton filed the test suit for Karl Jurva, Clatsop county alien fisherman, for the 66 cents collected by Croisan as import duty on salmon caught beyond the three mile limit.

## INFERNAL MACHINE IN LAWYER'S AUTO

AMARILLO, Texas, June 25.—(AP)—Mrs. A. D. Payne, wife of a well known Amarillo attorney, was blown to pieces, and her 14-year-old son probably fatally injured today when the Payne automobile was destroyed by what police believe was an infernal machine.

The boy was hurled 30 feet into the yard. The chassis of the car was left intact and the gas tank was undamaged.

Bits of wiring and pieces of dry cell batteries were found by detectives, and they said they believed either dynamite or some other powerful explosive had been placed in the automobile.

PENDLETON, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Tom C. Elliott, Milton, Republican state committeeman, today called a meeting here for Monday night of the 18 committeemen in eastern Oregon counties. Elliott said the meeting was not called so much to discuss the selection of a Republican gubernatorial nominee as to discuss matters of interest to eastern Oregon.

## M.E. CONFEREES HIT FILMS AND PRAISE W.C.T.U.

### Oregon Churchman Given Resolutions Favoring Federal Movie Commission to Raise Plane.

ASTORIA, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Action on recommendations commending agencies promoting the enforcement of the eighteenth amendment and condemning the motion picture industry, drafted yesterday by the temperance, prohibition and public morals committee of the Oregon Methodist Episcopal church, will be taken today.

The committee, headed by Dr. Clarence True Wilson, Washington, D. C., general secretary of the church's national board, recommended that the work of the W. C. T. U. and the Anti-Saloon league was "most commendable" and a copy of the resolution be forwarded to congress.

**Films a Menace.**  
The same resolution claimed the American motion picture industry "is undermining the Christian influence of home and church, menacing law abiding citizenship and misrepresenting American life to the nations of the world."

The resolution continued that "repeated efforts to improve the moral standards of motion pictures by cooperation with the industry have failed to secure the desired results," and, therefore, be it resolved that we cooperate with the Federal Motion Picture Council of America in its effort to obtain passage of a bill declaring the motion picture a public utility and providing for a federal motion picture commission to regulate the trade practices of the industry."

## STEPHEN PORTER, STATESMAN, DIES

PITTSBURGH, June 25.—(AP)—The brilliant career of Stephen G. Porter, one of the nation's foremost statesmen, is ended at 52.

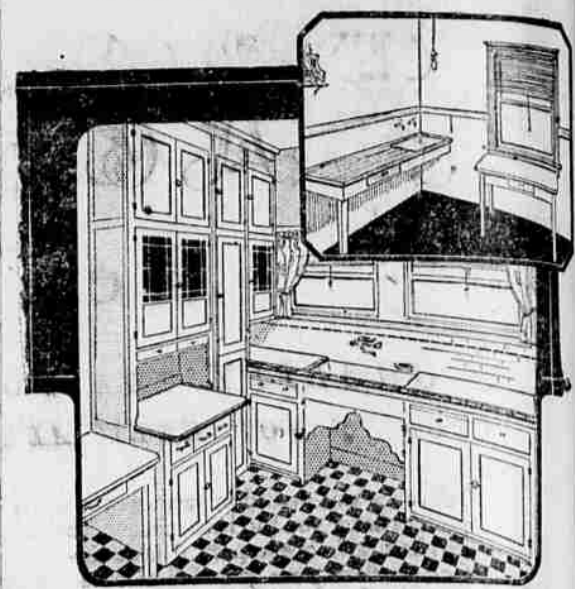
Mr. Porter died early today while messages of solicitude and sympathy poured in from all over the world. Members of his family were at the bedside.
