KOZER ADVOCATES MORE BUILDINGS

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—A state building program to cover a period of some years in the future is advocated by Sam A. Koger, state budget director, in a statement made public Sunday. He declares that such a program is necessary if the constantly growing number of state wards are to be cared for adequately in the penitentiary, the insane hospital, feeble-minded home and other state institutions.

Since the insane hospital at Salem is filled to capacity and the Pendleton institution is approaching that point he thinks it may be necessary before many years to build a third state hospital for the insane.

She completed three outside loops out of five attempts yesterday to thrill a crowd of 3,000 persons. The difficult aviation feat was accomplished by plunging upside down at 2,000 feet at 200 miles hourly and then swinging upward to complete the loop.

Tex Rankin, Portland aviator, who last year made 18 consecutive outside loops, said Miss Hooper's performance was perfect.
