CANADIAN COMET OF TRACK FADES

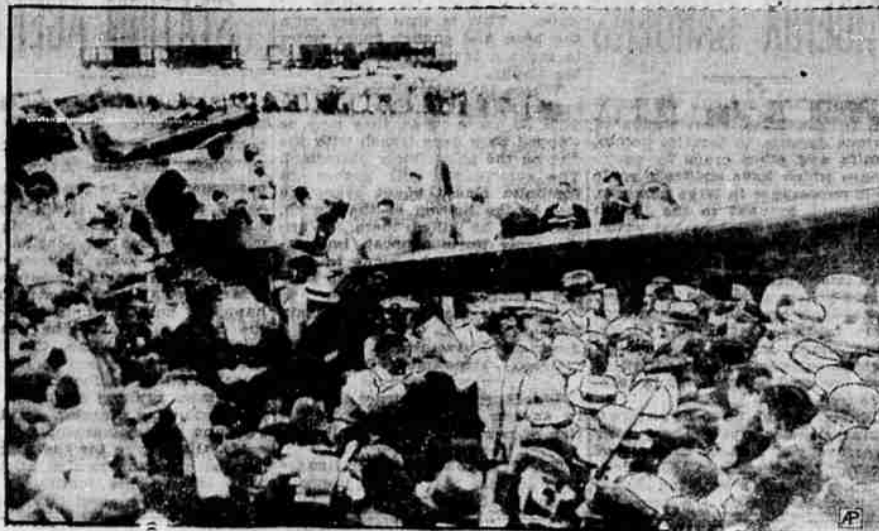
VANCOUVER, B. C., July 2.—(AP)—The "Canadian Comet" disappeared yesterday and experts are skeptical as to whether it will show up again.

The streak faded out yesterday afternoon when Percy Williams, trailed Eddie Tolson and George Simpson, in a special 100 meter race in the Donjon day track and field meet.

Bobby Robinson, University of Oregon negro, gave the fans a thrill when he vaulted 13 feet 6 1/2 inches to break the Canadian mark of 13 feet 3 3/8 inches.

More than 100 men and women athletes from the United States and Canada competed in 22 events.

FOUL BLOWS OUT IN GOTHAM RING

NEW YORK, July 2.—(AP)—In the future, there will be no foul punches in New York ring. The New York state athletic commission has legislated them out of existence.

Under a new regulation adopted by the commission, boxers will devise their own implements of protection, subject to approval by the commission, and then waive all right to claim a foul wherever a blow may land.

All referees in this state will be informed that all fighters claiming a foul in the future shall be counted out.

An automobile, wisely bought, used and cared for, is not an extravagance for any man. It is a necessary part of modern equipment, and to do without it is the worst kind of "false economy."

Proctor & Gamble, which is the family name of Ivory soap, is reported to have purchased the French Cadum Soap company, one of the biggest in Europe, with a business of \$25,000,000 a year.

The Proctor & Gamble people are considering other purchases of soap companies, in Britain, France and Germany. In the days of Caesar and Lucullus, men went out to conquer nations with men.

Now dollars do the work and are the soldiers, conquering more quietly, more surely.

Mr. Lingle, reporter for the Chicago Tribune, murdered, turns out to have been deep in the plans, and probably sharing the profits of gangsters, according to detective's statements. His salary was \$60 a week, and his income \$50,000 a year.

The most serious statement in this lamentable exposure is that Lingle dealt in police promotion. To be made police lieutenant the charge was \$1,500, for a captain, \$5,000.

No wonder some of the police turn to graft and gangsters, when the position they hold is part of a graft system.

The incident in no way discredits the Chicago Tribune, which knew nothing of Lingle's underworld life.

However, Colonel McCormick, and Major Patterson, whose ownership controls the Tribune, will want to know what particular individual in the Tribune organization did know of Lingle's activities, supporting him with the Tribune's authority, and presumably sharing his profits.

A circuit court jury late yesterday, in the civil suit of A. C. Mansfield against the Southern Oregon Stages, Inc., returned a verdict in favor of Mansfield in the sum of \$3,100 for general damages and \$300 for auto damage. Mansfield asked for \$26,500.

The suit was the outgrowth of an auto accident on the Green Spring highway a year ago. The testimony showed that the stage struck the car in which Mansfield was riding, causing it to topple over a precipice.

ATTACK SUSPECT TO GRAND JURY

Ed Corey, 26, arrested last week at Klamath Falls for an attack on a 12-year-old Rogue River girl, entered a plea of not guilty when given a hearing in the Gold Hill justice court this forenoon. His bonds were set at \$10,000 and he was bound over to the grand jury.
