DOODGE EIGHT IS CROSSING CONTINENT MILEAGE MARATHON

DETROIT, Mich., July 6.—Travelling at a fast average touring speed, anticipated at 500 miles a day—the pace it is destined to maintain for hundreds of thousands of miles—a Dodge Brothers stock model Eight-in-Line sedan is today crossing the continent on the first lap of what is hoped to be the greatest automobile endurance race ever attempted in the history of the industry.

During the first 21 days of this sensational mileage marathon, Dodge dealers throughout the United States will observe "Dodge National Demonstration Month." They will make a special effort to have as many persons as possible ride in and drive Dodge Brothers automobiles.

Miller and his relief pilot drove the marathon car away from the mammoth Dodge plant here in the midst of an enthusiastic demonstration. Thousands of workmen roared a hearty cheer as K. T. Keller, president of the company; W. J. O'Neill, vice president in charge of manufacturing; John R. Lee, vice president of commercial relations; A. vanDerZee, general sales manager; and G. B. Another interesting feature of the ceremonies was the routing of the pioneer Dodge workmen who have been continuously employed by the company for 15 years. The Dodge veterans predicted that the mileage marathon will prove conclusively that the stamina and dependability of the present Dodge car surpasses beyond a doubt, any that has preceded it.

The attempt will be made by the drivers of the Dodge marathon car to lower existing cross-country speed records. The mileage march will travel at a comfortably fast touring speed, about the average maintained today by the ordinary driver on a long distance trip. The main difference is that the Dodge Eight will keep up this pace day after day for a period of time that has probably never before been approached by any other automobile under any circumstances.

On its first trip across the country the car is being piloted by L. B. Miller, a famous cross-country driver whose round trip speed record of 1927 between San Francisco, New York and back to Los Angeles still stands. Miller's time for this 6721 mile trip was exactly one minute less than seven days.

In the Old Home Town

(Kansas City Star) Those of us who were brought down in the Old Home Town were surprised to read in the Old Home paper last week of the passing of John Wadsworth Hart. There were two items of interest in the obituary as printed in the Old Home paper relative to Mr. Hart. One of the items of interest was that Mr. Hart's middle name was Wadsworth. We knew that he sometimes was referred to as "John W." Hart, but generally speaking he was known to all of the community "uncles" in the Old Home Town none had more nephews and nieces (you would think to hear the children call him "uncle") than had this kindly man.

But that his name was John Wadsworth Hart strikes us as one of the features of Old Home Town life worth remembering. For the last man one would guess from intimate acquaintance as bearing that name was "Uncle" John Hart. He was, many years ago, the champion blacksmith of the town. Over the door of his shop, we recall, was a sign conveying the information "Horses Shod Here." Another sign imparted the intelligence, "Ploughs Sharpened Here." And Uncle John did not limit his trade to shoeing horses and sharpening plows. In our early school days we frequently held street debates on the question of whether Uncle John had spelled correctly the sign: "Wagons Mended." Indeed, many of us learned how to spell plow and wagon because we first learned deeply looking back now to our youthful acquaintance with the Old Home Town blacksmith, we doubt if he could so much as read the simplest and plainest of English. He had little time for anything of that kind, goodness knows, and we never saw him reading a paper.

And the other surprise to us in reading the obituary in the Old Home paper was that Uncle John Hart was 94 years old when he died. It seems to us now that he must have been as old as 90 as far back as the late '50's and the early '60's. We recall at one time in the intermediate room of the old school, when sweet little Virgie Metz, the teacher, was attempting to enlighten us concerning Santa Claus, that Sherman Clark was deeply looking back now to our youthful acquaintance with the Old Home Town blacksmith, we doubt if he could so much as read the simplest and plainest of English. He had little time for anything of that kind, goodness knows, and we never saw him reading a paper.

WORLD PREPARING FOR ANOTHER WAR SAYS LOYD GEORGE BOURNEMOUTH, England, July 5.—(AP)—A warning that the international atmosphere is "poisoned" with mistrust and suspicion was delivered to the banquet of the International Congregational church council delegates last night by former Premier David Lloyd George.

THE LIBERAL leader declared the peace of the world depended on the co-operation of Great Britain and the United States. "Peace is by no means secure," he said. "In spite of treaties, man has not given up the idea of war. Preparations for war are going on in every country of the world. There are more men trained for war in Europe, Asia and America than before the great catastrophes of 1914."

Lloyd George said except for countries like Germany that were forced to reduce armaments, Great Britain was the only country that had diminished its forces to a point where they were at least no more than before the war. Continuing, he said: "We have no covenants against war; we have pacts we have all signed that there shall be no more war, and we are spending more preparing for things we have determined should never happen again."

SAVES BLOWN UP IN TESTS ON NEW PROVING GROUND

NEW YORK, July 6.—(AP)—The Underwriters Laboratories announces establishment of a bomb proof proving ground. The shelter is in an abandoned rock quarry at Lamont, Ill., protected by a cliff 70 feet high and by rock barricades. Safes are wrecked in order to ascertain the types that resist burglary most. Holes are made in them with torches and drills. Nitroglycerine is manufactured on the lot in a special laboratory and its power determined by blowing to bits cold rolled steel shafting.
