

PLYMOUTH TEST CAR STARTS RUN THURSDAY, 2 P. M.

Plans are being completed for the economy motor test run to be conducted in conjunction with Plymouth car dealers of this city. The motor endurance test will begin Thursday afternoon at two o'clock when Lee Cathey, well-known automobile stunt driver, will set forth on his 50-hour non-stop ride.

Medford dealers who handle Plymouth motor cars and will sponsor the endurance event, are Eakin Motor company, Mead-Furch Motor company, and J. J. Oenbrugge. Cathey, who has had experience in driving all makes of cars, has selected the new Plymouth product for his economy test on account of the silvertone high compression head, and its ease of handling.

Sheriff Ralph Jennings will place the official seal on the motor and radiator cap of the car so that no oil or water can be added during the entire 50-hour drive, which will end Saturday, July 12.
