

GIRL USES TAXI PLANE FOR SUICIDE

Nebraska Co-Ed Leaps 1200 Feet to Death As Ship Circles for Landing at Lincoln Field—Cause of Deed Is Mystery.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 8.—(P)—A plunge from an airplane, soaring over the municipal airport late yesterday cost the life of Miss Alberta Brinkerhoff, 21 year old University of Nebraska co-ed.

A few minutes before the pilot of the low winged monoplane, Peter Orr, had pulled the young woman into the cockpit of the ship after she had stepped out on the wing, he was circling the airport, preparing to land the ship, when the young woman again climbed out on the wing and fell to earth from an altitude of approximately 1200 feet. Her body was found on the flying field.

Friends of the university senior said she had not been despondent and could advance no cause for her actions.

No Inquest
Meanwhile C. A. Hugart, acting coroner, expressed the belief that it was a case of suicide and County Attorney Max G. Towle said an inquest probably would not be held.

Arriving at the airport in a taxi-cab, Miss Brinkerhoff arranged to make a brief flight. Orr, pilot for a flying school, began warming up the motor of the ship, and Miss Brinkerhoff laughingly remarked that she was getting nervous.

The plane roared down the runway and was soon high above the airport. Before the take-off, Miss Brinkerhoff had been strapped in the cockpit.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chester Brinkerhoff were expected today, from their home at Mount Clare, Nebr.
