

DRY LAW OPPOSED BY BANKS

Medford Independent Candidate for Senator Also Opposes Farm Relief, Chain Stores and Tariff—Senator McNary's Defeat Is Demanded in Nominating Speech.

The independent candidacy of Lewellyn A. Banks, local orchard man, for U. S. senator, was formally launched at the army last night, following speeches by Mr. Banks and E. E. Kelly, chairman of the meeting, when over 100 members of the audience signed petitions asking him to run.

These petitions were circulated at the meeting before the speaking and entertainment program began, mainly by Howard Hill, orchard man; Al Panzer, general manager of the Medford Daily News, and H. T. Hubbard, who aids Mr. Banks in looking after the latter's local fruit interests.

A musical program of which Ed Andrews, well known light opera comedian, was in charge, with Mrs. George Andrews as accompanist, and vocal solos by Ellow Mae Wilson, Mr. Sutherland of Roseburg and Ed himself was interspersed between the speeches.

Mr. Sutherland sang what some of the ardent Bankites deemed a prophetic rendition, "I Hear You Calling Me" and Ed Andrews sang the famous ditty "Titwillow" from "The Mikado," and gave a recitation.

Chairman Kelly introduced E. E. Kelly called the meeting to order and stated its purpose. A motion prevailed that he be made chairman and Mr. Hubbard secretary.

The speaker declared that the time has come to inaugurate drastic changes in government and to elect men of character to public office next fall. Then he presented Mr. Banks as an independent candidate for U. S. senator and as an "idealist," whose ideal is conformance to the Constitution and as "standing for a square deal."

Mr. Banks was applauded and his utterances also met with applause several times throughout his address of 30 minutes, which he read from typewritten pages.

Mr. Banks spoke, in part, as follows: "I take this occasion to declare that the greatest enemies to individual efforts and to agricultural America are the emulcaries of our infamous federal reserve banking system.

"Bank examiners have become the very terror to independent banking enterprises. They constitute a veritable system of spies and have declared that securities backed by first mortgages on land are unsafe securities. They have advocated placing money on call on the stock market. They demand that the bankers invest the great deposits entrusted to them by the people into quick assets, all of which has made it impossible for an honorable banker to render any assistance to agriculturists in his respective community.

"The greatest single obstacle today facing the farmers of America is the whipped dog attitude of the bankers.

"Mr. Herbert Hoover is a guiding genius back of this movement to merge American finances into the hands of a few large institutions.

"Opposes Chain Stores. "The development of the chain store" system, which has swept America like a great tidal wave, rolling in from the Atlantic to the Pacific, is another one of Herbert Hoover's pet schemes for centralized control.

"Hooverism has risen up as a challenge to our Democratic form of government. If the people believe that democracy is a failure, then they will support the Hoover policy, but if they still believe that the United States of America should have a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, they will rise up to a man and overthrow his bureaucratic.

"America must return to the faith of the founders of our nation. Life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness must be re-established throughout the land. Therefore, as a candidate on an independent ticket for a seat in the United States Senate, from the state of Oregon, the first principle that I will enunciate, and which should be the governing principle in all that I follow is: Asks Repeal of Prohibition.

"The eighteenth amendment to our constitution was a war measure. It was passed by the people under the hysteria of the world's greatest conflagration. Eleven years have passed since the people cast their ballot on this amendment.

"Eleven years of disaster far law. Eleven years of crime. Eleven years of the debauchery of our public officials has proved beyond all question a doubt that this amendment to our constitution has been overwhelmingly repudiated by the people and is regarded by them as an abrogation of their constitution.

"It can no longer be received as a measure of temperance. The results have been exaggerated in temperance. It has made America a nation of hypocrites. Alcoholism has been popularized. The saloon has been removed from the corner into the sacred precincts of the homes. The debauchery of the home is the scandal of America. The disrespect for law and order next fall. 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the most dastardly effort to disfranchise the agriculturists of America ever attempted in the history of the world. The Russian communist scheme is a mild effort in the same direction by comparison.

Agricultural College Is Rapped. "Our agricultural colleges, and many other colleges, have become the hotbed of political intrigue. They are working in perfect harmony with bureaucratic dominations. They were the originators of the farm relief act. They are the foundation of the evils that beset agricultural America. They frame our agricultural laws through the states and have the support of the Hoover administration. These colleges must be divorced from politics before tranquility and peace can reign in agricultural enterprises.

"It is inconceivable under a democratic form of government and under the constitutional rights of the people for our federal government to enter business enterprises in direct competition with its constituents.

"The interferences of federal government with private business enterprises must be removed.

"My appeal is not addressed merely to the sovereign people of the state of Oregon, but is addressed to the foreign people of America. The Hoover administration must be impeached by the entire nation. The wicked conspiracies against the constitutional rights of the people must be overthrown, not only in Oregon, but in every other state in the union.

McNary Must Go. "Charles L. McNary, the senior senator from this state, is an integral part of the Hoover administration. By his failure to defend the constitutional rights of his constituents he has alienated himself from all rights to the confidence, loyalty and support of the voter in the state of Oregon.

"Charles L. McNary stands as a sponsor for the infamous farm relief act. He stands as a sponsor for the greatest conspiracy ever attempted in all history against the constitutional rights of the people.

"Charles L. McNary must not only be defeated, but so decisively defeated that all America will repudiate the wicked conspiracies against their rights by the Hoover administration.

"Entering the field as an independent candidate for the United States senate, opposing Charles L. McNary, I am governed by a single motive of patriotic duty.

"I have never been in politics. I have never sought an office. My ambitions and inclinations and life's work, from childhood have been toward the soil. The urgency of the performance of a patriotic service compels me to leave temporarily the field of a lifetime activity and devote a portion of my time to the patriotic services of my country.

"Party adherence has no place in the political drama that will soon be enacted throughout America. Americans are now facing but one issue, whether they are patriots to their country, whether they believe in their constitutional rights, whether they will stand in defense of their property rights, or whether they are aliens to their institutions and negligent and disloyal, in defense of their citizenship.

Wants Overwhelming Vote. "I not only ask the sovereign people of the State of Oregon to elect me to the United States senate, to supplant Charles L. McNary, but I ask for such an overwhelming endorsement to the principles I have enunciated that all the people of America will understand that Oregon repudiates the Hoover administration and its conspiracies.

BEETLE CONTROL IN DIAMOND LAKE AREA EFFECTIVE

DIAMOND LAKE, Ore., July 9.—(Special)—Only 50 beetle-infested trees were found in the eight miles of water front of Diamond Lake this year, where 2000 were four years ago. A. J. Jenckle, insect control specialist of the United States forestry service, who has just completed a beetle survey over this district, states that the sun-cure method recently perfected has proved highly successful.

As the lake shore is used by thousands of campers every year, the lodgepole trees which make up most of the forest near the lake are considered by the forestry service to have a high recreational value. Diamond Lake is in the Umpqua national forest and is therefore protected and administered by the forest service. They propose to continue this protection for the Diamond Lake forests. Most of the infested trees are from 100 to 150 years of age and it costs less than a dollar a tree to sun-cure the beetle-attacked trees.

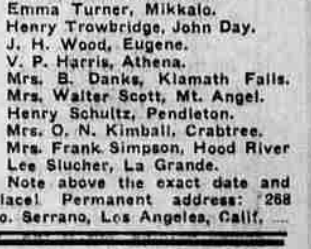
