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IS ANOTHER WAR IN EUROPE INEVITABLE?

SIXTEEN years have passed since the outbreak of the World War, and yet as far as another European conflict is concerned, conditions are almost identical with those which existed in July, 1914, only the roles of Italy and Germany are reversed.

England today is holding aloof, as she did before 1914, but as her sympathies were with France then, her sympathies today—as far as any exist—are against her.

JUST as before 1914 only a spark was needed to set off the magazine, the same being supplied by the incident of Sarajevo; so today only a spark is needed to again plunge Europe into a sanguinary war.

Even such a well informed and conservative student of international affairs as Frank H. Simon declares: "I do not wish to seem an alarmist, yet in my judgment the situation between France and Italy could lead to conflict at any moment."

On the Italian frontier, France now has her army on a war basis. The forts have been overhauled, all preparations for meeting invasion have been made.

In the face of this situation the dramatic and belligerent Duce returns the Fascist salute and cries: "It is I myself who ordered the military review, because words are fine things, but bullets, machine guns, ships, airplanes and big guns are even better."

It is the voice of Mussolini, but the phrase of William the Second. Like the Kaiser, Duce may be staging a diplomatic bluff only to arouse the fighting spirit of his people.

REGARDING such a situation from this side of the Atlantic only one phrase seems appropriate: "What fools we mortals be."
