

# 144 MINERS LOSE LIVES IN GERMANY

### Eighty-One Bodies Badly Burned, Recovered From Shaft — Gas Pocket Is Blamed for Explosion and Resulting Lethal Fumes.

NEURODE, Germany, July 10.—(AP)—At least 144 persons lost their lives yesterday in an explosion at the Wenceslas mine. Eighty-one bodies have been recovered, most of them burned badly. No hope is held for those remaining in the shaft.

Of 193 miners in the shaft at the time of the explosion only 49 escaped and they were badly injured. The explosion in the mine occurred when a large gas pocket was suddenly tapped during blasting late yesterday. The fumes spread through the shafts so quickly that there was little chance for anyone to escape.

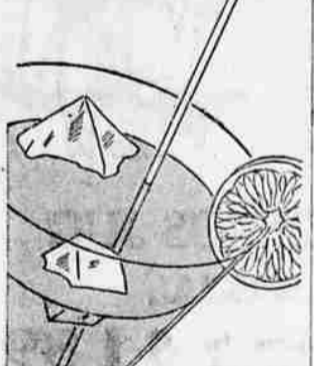
It was possible to save only 49 persons of the 193 in the mine before breaking off the rescue work. All of these, although badly burned, are expected to recover. The disaster took both men and officials completely off their guard in view of the periodical gas survey having been completed only Sunday.

It was by far the greatest mine disaster Germany has known in years. In 1912 117 died in the Dechum mine disaster, and in 1925 the death toll in the Dortmund mine reached 135. Rescuers found the dead miners still with tools in their hands, wagon men beside their wagons, and the electromotive pilot lifeless at his controls.

# CARROLL AND SHOW GIRLS FACE COURT

### Producer and Eight Dancers Charged With Indecency in 'Vanities' Scenes—Two Fans Not Sufficient Costume, Say Officers.

NEW YORK, July 10.—(AP)—Through a cluster of 200 persons who gathered on the sidewalks, Earl Carroll, producer, made his way into Jefferson Market court today with eight dancers and show girls from his newest revue and again gave himself up to the law. A warrant for Carroll, who landed in Atlanta prison because of his denial of his famous bath tub party four years ago, was issued yesterday after police had raided his "Vanities." Carroll was not at the theater when the raid was made; his appearance today was brief. A few minutes after he and his show girls entered the courtroom the trial was adjourned until tomorrow so his attorney might familiarize himself with the case.

Among those who appeared with him at Jefferson market today was Faith Bacon, whose dance, in an attire of two ostrich fans, the police considered indecent. The show girls under arrest appeared in a tableau scene in which they represented wax figures coming to life.

### Imprisoned 4 Years Ago.

Carroll went to Atlanta following a party in his theater four years ago, when he denied statements made by guests that a young woman bathed in a tub of champagne. He was indicted for perjury, convicted and imprisoned. The prisoners included Naomi Ray, comedienne, and Jimmie Sava and six show girls. Sava and the six girls were appearing in a scene entitled "A Window at Merik," in which the lone man finds himself among a group of wax figures that come to life. Miss Ray and Miss Bacon had dance numbers in both of which the police charged they were very scantily clad.

Those arrested were released in \$500 bail and were back in their places for the evening performance from which the show window scene was deleted.

## PHILCO TONE CONTROL NEW RADIO MARVEL

Through the skill of radio engineers, the listener is now able to adjust the tone of his radio as he likes them at the twist of a wrist, according to Clay Witham, Philco representative here. The new device, he says, regulates the tone of the programs received in accordance with the taste of the listener.

"This new development, which truly merits the title of 'radio's newest miracle,' is a triumph for the Philco staff of engineers," Mr. Witham explains. "Known as Tone Control, an exclusive feature to be found only on Philco radios, it enables the listener-in for the first time in radio history to adjust the tone of the program he is hearing. He has only to turn a knob and the device compensates for differences in the quality of tone broadcast from different stations, and for differences in sensitivity in the human ear. A turn of the knob gives him instantly any one of four different tone qualities: Brilliant tone, bright tone, mellow tone and deep tone.

"The tones of various broadcasting stations vary considerably. On some stations the circuits are so operated that high notes are over-emphasized, and the low notes at the opposite end of the scale are suppressed. All of this is remedied by turning the knob of the Philco tone control to deep, which automatically balances the bass and treble. Similarly, turning the dial to deep, subdues annoying interference noises from outside causes.

"Furthermore, this new engineering achievement adds materially to the enjoyment of radio, for the average listener-in will enjoy the feeling of regulating the tone of his instrument to suit himself."

This new device has been made standard equipment of all Philco radios, and will be on display soon at the Witham Super Service Station. Mr. Witham returned Monday from San Francisco where he attended the radio show.

## MICKEY MOUSE FILM BARRED IN GERMANY

BERLIN, July 10.—(AP)—The national board of film censorship will not permit the motion picture entitled "Mickey Mouse in the Trenches," to be shown in Germany. The censors hold that the wearing of German helmets by an army of cats which opposes a militia of mice is certain to be "offensive to national dignity," whether intended or not.
