Moulded Tuna Salad
Separate into flakes a 7 ounce can of White Star Tuna. Mix carefully with one cupful of diced celery, one tablespoonful of chopped green peppers, two tablespoonfuls of chopped olives and three-fourths cup of cooked salad dressing. Add two teaspoonfuls of vinegar and season with salt and pepper. Soak two tablespoonfuls of gelatin in one-fourth cup of cold water for five minutes. Dissolve by placing over hot water, then stir into the fish mixture. Turn into small wet moulds, set aside to chill. Serve on lettuce or water-cress and garnish with celery tips, slices of stuffed olives and pieces of green pepper or pimiento.

Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Pace of Phoenix, Ariz., are making an extended visit with their daughter, Mrs. Charles Thompson.

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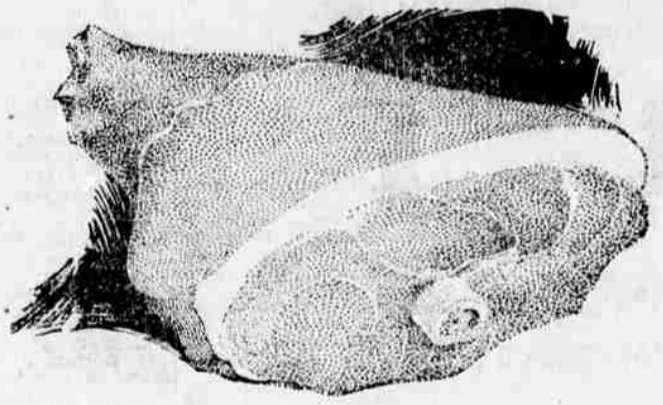
