SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—(AP) A cut in its quarterly dividend from 40 cents to 35 cents a share by Transamerica corporation stockholders today, following an announcement by Eliza Walker, chairman of the board of directors, that this recommendation would be made to the board. The recommendation also would eliminate the stock dividend.

LICENSE UPON MIDGET GOLF TO BE TALKED

So popular has proven the recently established miniature golf course at Figate and Oakdale streets, attracting hundreds of players and onlookers, the latter especially from autos stopped in the street, and with another midget course under construction on North Riverside avenue and a third one talked of, that it is likely that the city council at its next meeting Tuesday night will pass an ordinance changing a license fee for operation of a course, and possibly regulatory conditions, especially as regards parking on the street by or near a course.

It became known today that upon the attention of Mayor Pipes and the councilmen being called to the matter, and that the midget golf course craze was fast gaining Medford, as in various other parts of the nation, City Attorney Frank P. Farrell was instructed to draw such an ordinance for the council to act on.

The course now in operation has been doing a land office business and the other one soon will be, and the argument for a license fee is based on the contention that its operator should be charged a reasonable fee, the same as the theatres and other amusements. Judging from the amount of auto traffic existing at the present midget course, players parking their cars nearby and occupants of hundreds of cars passing day and night stopping on the street for at least a few minutes to watch the players, the argument is that very soon a special city traffic cop or other officer must be stationed on duty to see that there is no traffic congestion on the streets or the sidewalks surrounding the course. Then, too, it is pointed out that on Sundays the many cars parked on South Oakdale of the Christian church attendants, together with those parking near the midget golf course, may soon get so big as to practically close at least half of South Oakdale, between Eighth street and the church edifice Sunday forenoons and evenings.

Hence the need of a special officer to keep traffic unobstructed, by the persons who argue to the city officials for a license fee and regulatory ordinance for midget golf courses a reasonable license fee would aid in the expense of the city government maintaining such an officer.

A bigger traffic embarrassment for the city officials is foreseen when the North Riverside miniature golf course is opened for operation.
