JONES, WIZARD OF GOLF WINS BY 40 FT. PUTT

Open Title Won For Fourth Time By Final Sensational Shot—Great Pro Stars Routed—Smith Finishes Second.

INTERLACHEN CLUB, MINNEAPOLIS, July 12.—(AP)—The king of all golfers, flushed with the heat of one of the greatest battles of his career, the professional light brigade in hot pursuit and a 40-foot putt over the rolling turf before him, while close to 10,000 spectators held their breath, Bobby Jones stepped up briskly and hit the ball true into the cup for a birdie 3 that closed the door to all challengers, clinching his fourth victory and successful defense of the open golf championship of the United States.

Mac Smith, alone of the stars pros to stand the gaff of the final day after Jones had burned up the course with a record-breaking third round, finished with rounds of 70-74-74-70 for 289 to clinch second place.

Horton Smith, the 22-year-old professional who shot himself into the lead at the half way mark only to crack today wound up in third place with a 292.

The rest of the professional clan, including such early threats as Jimmy Armour, Johnny Farrell, Charles Lacey, and Walter Hagen fell by the wayside, put to rout by the 28-year-old wizard from Georgia.

To show how badly beaten the big stars were Armour finished ten strokes to the rear with 297, Lacey with 298, Farrell 299, Len Diegel 301, Hagen 303, Denny Binnie 305, and Gene Sarazen 306. Jones, as it turned out, really clinched the championship he has won four times since 1923, by shooting an almost flawless 68 on a mark that might just as well have been as low as 66, but for some shoddy work on the last two holes.

Mac Smith, who has had the ill luck always to fall just a little short of capturing one of the main prizes of golf, was the only man in the field who refused to be altogether shaken off by Jones' great third round. With a fiery start, he cut his deficit from seven to three strokes on the first three holes of the final round.

Smith reached the high mark of his challenge when he pulled up to trail by a stroke at the 13th. A birdie on the 139-yard 12th gave Mac one stroke and he got another on the 194-yard 15th where Jones again skidded into a bad five. Here Bobby's tee shot veered to the rough and he failed to get up the bank to the green on his first try. Finally putting his third on and missing a six foot putt.

Once again Jones banged the door. He came back to the tough 444-yard 14th to fire second 15 feet from the pin and hole the putt for a birdie 3. Mac followed along with a par 4 and was two strokes behind.

After par four at the 15th, Bobby once again answered the knock of old man opportunity with a birdie that, as it turned out, meant the final margin of safety. This was at the big 16th he shot a 209-yard drive to the short rough, not more than ten yards from the green and then chipped dead for the three. Smith just missed duplicating this and took four.

It was three strokes in Jones' favor with two holes to go, but the 17th nearly cost him the championship. He rushed his tee shot to the edge of a pond, far to the right of the green in dense grass and with a clump of trees between the spot and with elevated green.

It was never actually discovered whether the ball sank in the water or soft mud at its edge, for the combined efforts of the crowd and officials failed to locate it. Under the tournament ruling, this pond was a "parallel water hazard" and the penalty one stroke.

The final putt Jones faced was uphill, over a big mound but it never wavered from the 40-foot line to the cup, clinching in the cup to climax one of the greatest finishes a champion ever gave for all to gaze at.

All gallant old Mac Smith needed to tie was an eagle two on this 406-yard layout. The par 4 was just a gesture, but it clinched second place for him and first prize money, for the professional clan, of \$1,000.

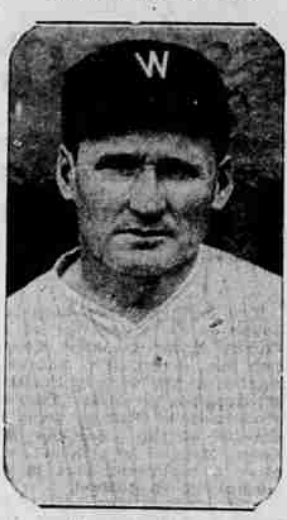
