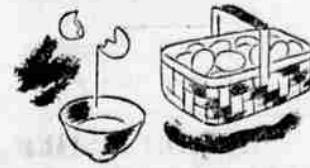
CREWS SISTERS ON COPCO HOUR TONIGHT

Displaying a hard smashing overhead game and an effective high bounding service, Jimmy Edmiston, Medford high school star, captured the Central Oregon tennis tournament singles title Sunday afternoon at Bend, defeating Joe Detrich, Oregon State college ace, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2, 7-5. Edmiston fought his way past some of the best tennis talent in the state to get to the finals.

Handicapped by darkness, the Medford entry in the doubles competition, Edmiston and Bailey, lost to Detrich and Ballantyne of Bend, 6-4, 3-6, 3-4, 6-2. Delayed until long after the starting hour because two of the players were in the singles finals, the match was played in semi-darkness which seriously handicapped both teams.

In the singles, Edmiston for the second time this season, defeated Kenneth Ballantyne, holder of the Central Oregon title for the past two years. They met in the semi-finals Sunday morning and the local went into the finals by eliminating Ivan White of Salem, 6-4, 6-2. Edmiston and Bailey went into the finals of the doubles by their victory over White and Dr. Russell of Salem.

More than 50 players participated in the tourney, which is conducted annually by the Bend Bulletin.
