Hay Fever Sufferers Find Help in Chiropractic

Hay fever is an acute inflammation of excessive heat of the mucous membranes lining the nasal passages as a general rule, and in some cases the inflammation extends down as far as the bronchi.

The upper portions of the respiratory tract are so swollen from the inflammation existing that breathing is very difficult, especially through the nasal passages, and the patient often resorts to mouth breathing.

The discharge from the nose is of a thin, watery, acid character, and is almost continuous in its exudation from the mucous membranes lining the air passages of the nose.

Hay fever is also known as "rose cold," "hay asthma" and "autumnal catarrh." Hay fever, in its most pronounced form, generally makes its appearance in the late summer, generally the latter part of July or early August, and with most sufferers terminates about the first part of October.

The pronounced stage of this disease begins with sneezing, the same as with an ordinary cold; the eyes become easily irritated, tears flow easily and continuously; the eyeballs become inflamed and the tissues around the eyeballs and the eyelids become congested and reddened.

In the eastern states the treatment prescribed is usually to go to Maine or up in the mountains, while in the middle western states it is to go to Colorado or Michigan or Wisconsin.

The great majority of sufferers however, cannot afford the time from business or the money to take a vacation of several months for the purpose of ridding themselves of the supposed "cause" of this disease.

Chiropractically, the cause of this disease is a subluxation at the fourth cervical vertebra, lower cervical or upper dorsal. That is, the most frequent subluxation found in cases of hay fever is the one found at the fourth cervical.

As stated before, medically this disease is considered practically incurable and the medical treatment is given merely with a view to removing the irritating symptoms of the disease. But from a Chiropractic standpoint, the prognosis is very favorable, and recovery is nearly always the rule.

LAST CALL FOR R. SCHILDKRAUT VETERAN ACTOR

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., July 15.—(AP)—Rudolph Schildkraut, 65, veteran of the stage and screen, died at 2:45 a. m. today at the home of his son, Joseph Schild-

kraut, film star. He had suffered a heart attack yesterday while working at a motion picture studio. The death of the actor was unexpected. He had appeared to be gaining strength last night and received several friends who entertained him by singing songs and playing a ukulele.

His son attended the opening of a stage play here and returned home at 1:30 a. m. After sitting up with his father a half hour Joseph retired. Forty-five minutes later his father died.

The elder Schildkraut suffered a slighter attack last November but recovered and resumed active screen work shortly afterwards. He was born at Constantinople and early in life started out on a stage career which earned him fame in continental Europe.

Tampering Constitution To Rule Personal Acts Endangers Usefulness

CLEVELAND, July 15.—(AP)—About 2,000 young members of the Wauther league, Lutheran church society in convention here, heard E. J. Gallmeyer, Fort Wayne, Ind., their president, declare "tampering with the United States constitution for the purpose of regulating personal conduct" places the constitution "in jeopardy."

Gallmeyer said: "Millions of our citizens believe our constitution should not be tampered with, but should be left as a fundamental guide. The great majority of our Lutheran group hold to this view for two important reasons."

"In the first place, because of the great prosperity which our country had enjoyed under our God-favored constitution. Learned economists hold that our progress and wealth are directly traceable to our fundamental law for it made possible individual development. Then having produced these, it should not be tampered with by propagandists."

"Secondly, we hold that our religious freedom, our greatest boon under the constitution, is placed in jeopardy when this fundamental instrument is used as a statute for regulatory laws. 'I am talking about tampering with the constitution for the purpose of regulating personal conduct,' the speaker explained. 'If well-meaning and sincere people can tell us what to eat and to drink, what assurance have we that they will not very shortly tell us how, when and where we shall worship?'"

TON-LITERS OF PIGS PRODUCED IN 25 STATES

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Nearly 600 ton-liters were produced during 1929 in 25 states, extending from Massachusetts to Washington and from Minnesota to Texas. The term "ton-liter" is used to designate combined weight of 2000 pounds or more at the age of six months. Ohio was first with 98 ton-liters, Tennessee second with 75, and Indiana and Kentucky tied for third with 62 each. Pennsylvania reported the heaviest litter, 17 pigs weighing 3887 pounds.

FOREST ABLAZE ON SAMS CREEK

A new forest fire of unknown origin broke out at 4:00 p. m. yesterday on state protected land in the Sams creek section at the head of Sams creek in brush, which through the efforts of Assistant District Forester William White, with three regular fire fighters, assisted by the farmers and others in that locality, was gotten under control after it had burned over an area of four or five acres, last night. No damage of any consequence is reported, and the fire is being carefully patrolled today.

Another small forest fire near Aspin peak, Klamath county, about 10 miles distant from Rocky Point, broke out yesterday afternoon in timber, which was reported under control by 9:00 o'clock last night. Nothing since had been heard from this fire at the Crater national forest office headquarters here.

The fire that has been burning for days past at Bluff prairie dam, several times breaking out after it had been placed under control, was this noon said to be practically extinguished. However, it is still being patrolled.
