

16 JACKSON CO. LADS TRAINING FOR MILITARY

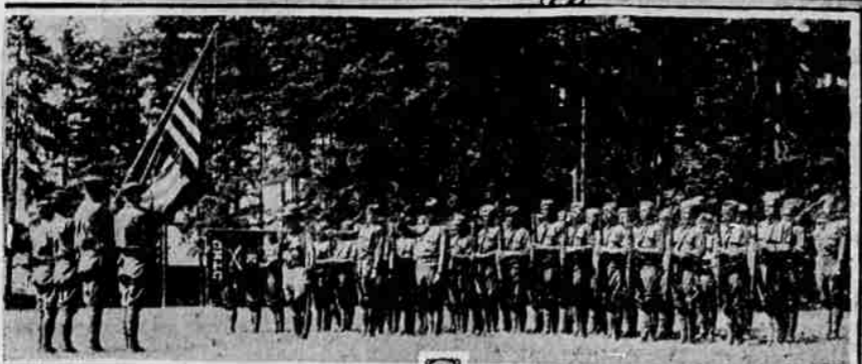
C. M. T. C. Life Rigorous But Beneficial — Gain Weight and Coat of Tan — Leave Camp Saturday.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wn. (Special)—Drawing rapidly to a close, with July 19 as the final day, the Citizens' Military Training camp here has for some of its achievements the noticeable improvement in the physical bearing of its 700 Oregon and southwestern Washington boys, the increase in weight of practically all students, and the marked improvement in discipline and obedience to commands. Among the other changes too, are the spirit of comradeship, and consciousness of American citizenship and wholesome spirit of rivalry in athletics — and a good, healthy coat of tan. Sleeping in tents, rolling out for reveille at 5:45 and turning in at 10 o'clock have worked wonders for these boys, on whom the United States government has expended an average of \$30 each, in its scheme of training for citizenship and national defense. Young men of 17 to 24 are eligible, and upon completion of the course of four camps, may qualify for reserve commissions in the army.

Instruction of the students in this year's camp here has been provided by the officers and picked enlisted men of the 3rd battalion, 7th Infantry. Major A. M. Jones, battalion commander, has been executive officer of C. M. T. C., with Captain H. W. Isbell as adjutant. Brigadier General Paul A. Wolf is commandant.

MICHIGAN FIGHTS ON PERCENTAGE BASIS

DETROIT, July 16. (AP)—Hereafter there will be no guaranteed purses for fighters in Michigan. This announcement was made by James M. (Bingo) Brown, chairman of the state boxing commission, who declared that "a fighter is worth only what he can draw at the gate" and that henceforth fighters will perform for a share of the receipts. Chairman Brown said he intends to ask the national boxing association to adopt a similar rule.

Tolley 'Burned Up' At Interlachen Wants No More Torrid Golfing

CHICAGO, July 16. (AP)—Cyril Tolley, former British amateur champion, will make a careful study of weather conditions before he plunges into future American golf tournaments. The big Briton, caught in the sweltering heat in the national open at Minneapolis last week, has made a tentative entry in the western amateur at Beverly next week. The tentative part is the weather. "Tolley said he could compete unless the weather got hot." Don K. Moe of Portland, Oregon, the defending western amateur champion said. "He was burned up at Minneapolis and doesn't want to play golf in that kind of hot weather again."

GALLANT FOX TO ENJOY VACATION

CHICAGO, July 16. (AP)—Gallant Fox has hinted for a vacation and may get it at once. So listless was the great three-year-old champion of American turf yesterday his owner became doubtful whether it would be advisable after all to enter him in the \$25,000 Arlington gold cup race Saturday. The fleet thoroughbred was stubborn and nothing much could be done with him.

BOXER SUCCEUMS FROM BODY BLOW

DAYTON, Ky., July 16. (AP)—Sammy Buchanan, junior welterweight boxer from Waycross, Ga., who fell to the canvas in the seventh round of his fight here Monday night with Jimmy Neal, Cincinnati, died early today in Speers hospital. Buchanan at first appeared to have suffered a hemorrhage of the stomach, but his condition was such that he could not be moved for an x-ray examination and hospital attendants were uncertain as to the cause of his death. The fighter died without regaining consciousness.

FERNANDEZ FAILS IN BID FOR TITLE

EAST HARTFORD, Conn., July 16. (AP)—Ignacio Fernandez, brown skinned little warrior from the Philippines, has made his bid for the featherweight championship of the world and suffered the first knockout of his career. He went down for the final count in the fifth round of his 15-round battle with the titleholder, Christopher (Bat) Battalino, while many of the crowd of 9000 booed. Fernandez a year ago knocked out Al Simper in three rounds. The end came after two minutes and 30 seconds of the fifth round. Battalino cornered Fernandez on the ropes and dropped him for the full count with a left hook to the head and a right to the chin. To Represent Norblad. SALEM, Ore., July 16. 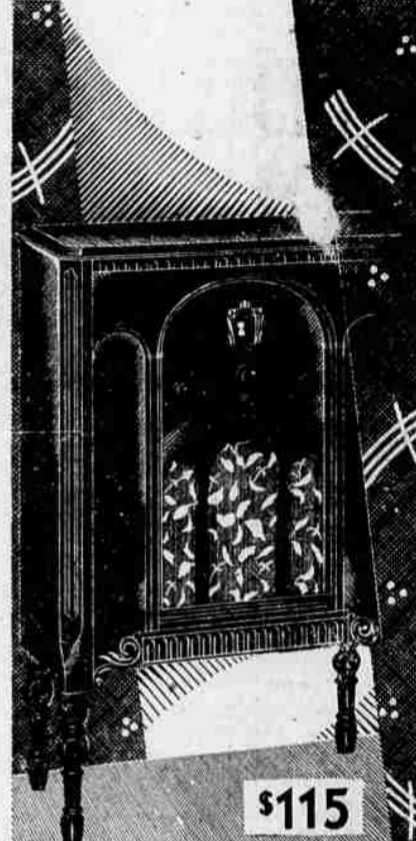
