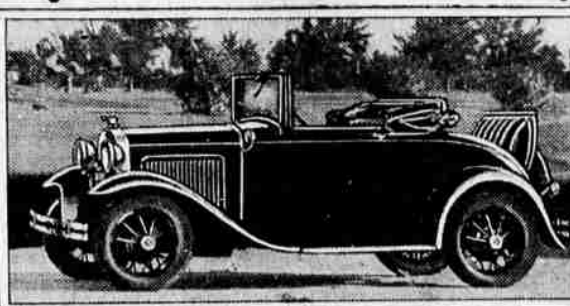
### CLIFF LORD WINS LOW GOLF HONOR ON MIDGET LINKS

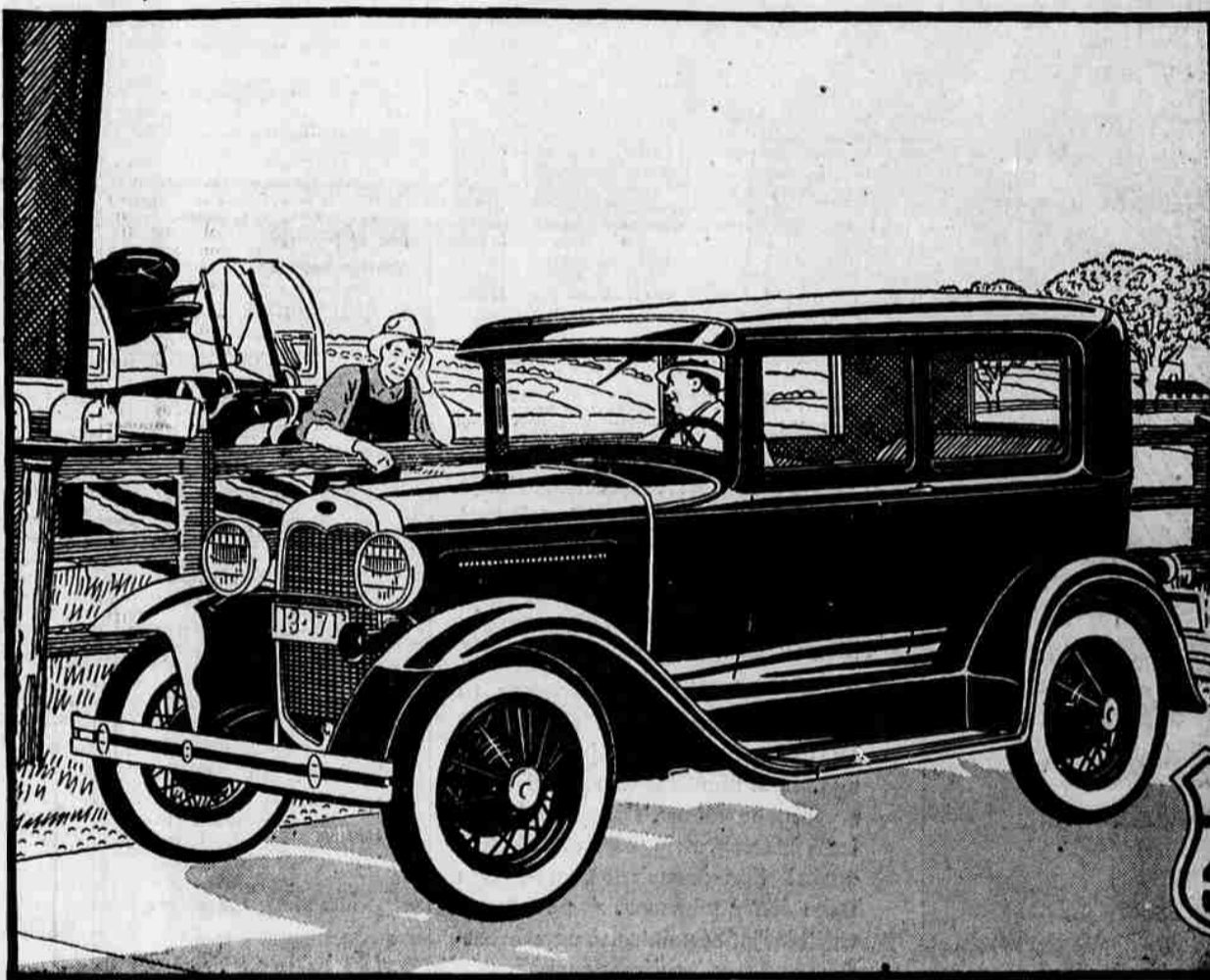
### DUNFORD SUFFERS FALL FROM LOFT APPLGATE BARN

D. Janskeep, attending physician today. Mr. Dunford's injuries have not all been determined. He has numerous fractured ribs, a broken nose and internal injuries. He is receiving treatment at the Sacred Heart hospital.

Mr. Dunford was brought to Medford about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon soon after the accident. He is reported to have been working on a derrick fork in the loft of the Crump barn when he lost his balance and fell to the ground about 24 feet below.

Because of the seriousness of his condition visitors are asked not to call at the hospital.
