COVER SPRAY FOR CODLING MOTH IS URGED BY AGENTS

The first cover spray for the control of second brood codling moth worms on apple and pear trees should be completed by July 26th. According to observations of moth traps in several parts of the valley, the flight is apparently the same in all localities and therefore the date mentioned applies to all orchards.

In case of apples, use three pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to the hundred gallons of water. On pears the arsenate of lead can be reduced to two pounds per hundred gallons.

Those who have not as yet sprayed with oil for spider mite control, should look at their pear trees carefully and in case of finding mites fairly numerous, a combination spray should be used at this time. The combination is as follows: One and one-quarter to one and one-half gallons of summer oil emulsion, plus one-half pound casinate spreader per one hundred gallons of the arsenate of lead solution.
