She wants to know if the yellow roses are in bloom at Butte Falls. She would like so much to see them—Margaret Poole, 12 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Poole, who is in the Shrine hospital in Portland, receiving treatment for the two legs, which many months ago refused to walk their little owner over the hills and country roads she loves so well.

She wrote the letter to her brother Bill, who was in Medford this morning. She asked about the yellow roses and told him of the happy times she plans to have with him after she undergoes another operation to straighten and leg, the knee cap of which has been destroyed by infection. When she gets a new knee cap, the doctors tell her, she will be able to walk.

"I am going to be brave," she assured Bill, while writing of the approaching operation and included "Not one kiss, but a million for the family."

Hope of her recovery is, also maintained by her father and mother, who were shopping here today. The little girl's case has been watched with interest by many residents of Medford as well as her home town, Butte Falls, since she received injuries while playing at school, which later developed into the loss of her ability to walk.

A few months ago she was sent to the Shrine hospital where physicians believe she will be made to walk again.

# RHINELANDER'S OCTORON WIFE GETS BIG SUM

LAS VEGAS, Nev., July 17.—(AP)—Two agreements, one secret and the other specifying payment of \$31,500 in cash to Mrs. Alice Jones Rhineland, and alimony of \$3600 a year for the remainder of her life, were entered today into the divorce decree granted Leonard Kip Rhineland, scion of a wealthy New York family, here recently.

The action brought to a close a threatened contest of the divorce by Mrs. Rhineland. The settlement was agreed upon late last night following a conference between Harley A. Harmon, attorney for Rhineland, and Leo A. McNamee, lawyer for the woman. Neither principal was in court.

While both attorneys refused to divulge the grounds of the secret agreement, they indicated last night it called for payment of between \$200,000 and \$500,000 to Mrs. Rhineland.

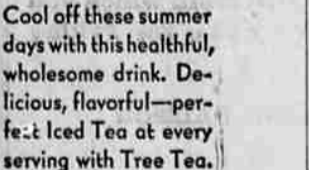
