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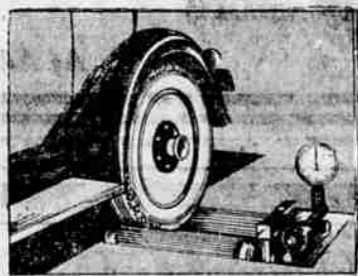

FIND BODY OF GRAHAM NEAR CRASH

Long Lost Aviator Died From Exposure Is Belief of Searching Party—End Came During Meal On Can of Tomatoes.

CEDAR CITY, Utah, July 17.—(AP)—The long search for Maurice Graham, ill-fated air mail pilot and world war veteran, has ended with the finding of his body, now only a skeleton in the mountains about 30 miles southeast of here today and the long, rough trip was to be made up into the mountains to return the body to Cedar City. The remains were found yesterday when six men, headed by Maj. Richard N. McDonald, a companion during the world war of Graham, six miles south of the spot where his wrecked plane was found three weeks ago in the Kanarru mountains 22 miles southeast of here. Apparently having met death from exposure in one of the worst blizzards the southwest has known, Graham's body was found in the underbrush near a creek he was following from the scene of the wreck and leading toward Zion national park.

Cards Identify Identification was made by the finding of two personal cards, his revolver and foodstuffs he had taken from the plane before abandoning it. When death came Graham apparently was sitting down to eat. In his left hand, which was resting across his chest, he held a knife and beside him lay a can of tomatoes with a hole punched in the top. In his right hand, lying over his head, he held his gun, fully loaded. An empty can of foodstuffs also lay beside the body. The discovery climaxed an intensive search of the vicinity which has been under way since discovery of the plane. The clue that is believed to have been mainly responsible for ending the mystery was found last Saturday in the discovery of a burned out campfire and articles identified as from a kit carried by the flier three miles south of the scene of the wreckage.

Leave Guards at Site In addition to McDonald, the men who found the body included Jimmy Allen of Los Angeles, a cousin of the pilot. McDonald and Allen returned to Cedar City, leaving the other four men to guard the body. McDonald immediately notified the Western Air Express of the air mail run from Los Angeles to Salt Lake City. It was on the last leg of his flight that he became lost in a storm over Nevada and Utah late on the night of January 10. Graham is survived by his widow, who lives in Hollywood, and his two children, Monte and Melodite, boy and girl twins, 8 years old.

WAGONTIRE SPRING BATTLE RESUMED

PORTLAND, July 17.—(AP)—Again taking up the fight for free water on the range lands of the Wagon Tire Mountain district in Lake county, the Oregon Humane society has sent a representative to Washington, D. C., to intercede with the government. The controversy which flamed into white heat last year has been renewed, all because Frank Dobkins has fenced his land. Dobkins has 640 acres. Bill Brown has 160 acres and a fine, cool spring. Dobkins' land completely encircles Brown's place. For years Brown has had his water-hole open to the public. Range cattle, horses and sheep were welcome there. Then Dobkins fenced his land and effectively bars all animals from the spring.
