The gladioli show, now in session at the chamber of commerce building, will remain open until 8 o'clock Saturday night. Mrs. Irene DeLosh announced today. This arrangement has been made to accommodate the many people who have asked for more time to visit the exhibits.

More than 500 women viewed the flowers yesterday and about 250 had visited the exhibits at noon today. The gladioli, which are of rare varieties, are grown near Grants Pass by A. L. Smith, D. S. Pruitt and R. F. Rainey. Mrs. DeLosh is their local representative. A spray of blossoms is given each guest, who visits the displays during the show.

PROGRESS SEEN IN SQUAW LAKE WATER PROJECT

Hutton Reports Financing Will Be Completed By October—Development to Cost \$600,000.

Good progress, however slow, is being made by the Medford Water Power and Development company, in the financing of the Squaw Lake mining and irrigation project, according to Harry Hutton, Eugene and Medford hotel operator, and one of the guiding spirits in the enterprise.

The matter has been hanging fire for nearly a year, and like many other development activities throughout the nation, was temporarily set back by the Wall Street collapse.

Mr. Hutton now reports that "money and investments have started to loosen up, and we expect to have the work all financed by October 1st." It is estimated that the development will cost close to \$600,000.

The company proposes to ditch the waters of Squaw lake to the Sterling mine, and mine the higher levels of that historic paying property, and to run the waters into the Griffin creek district—the largest unirrigated area in the valley.

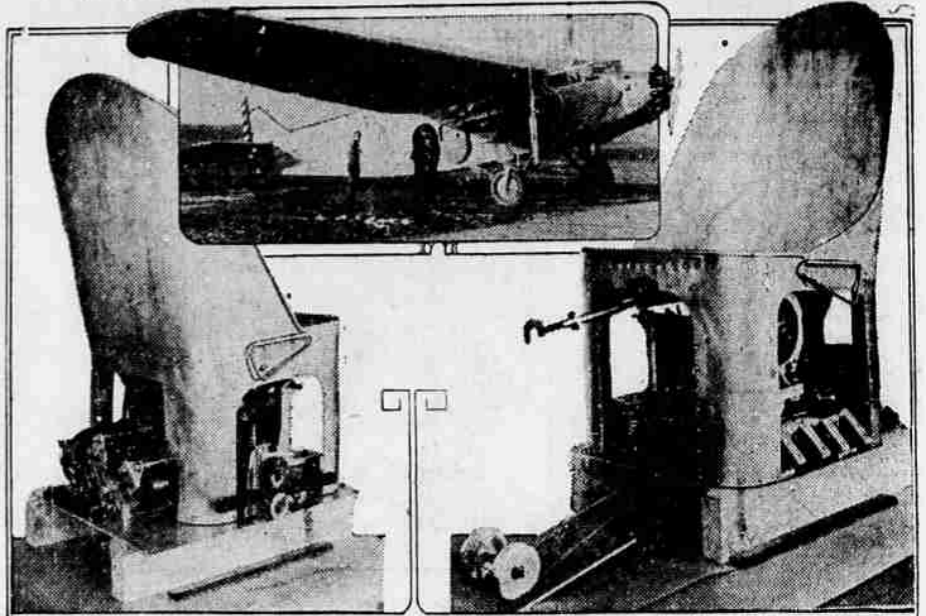
The present water stringency exemplifies the need of more irrigation projects here, to meet the agricultural and horticultural needs, it is pointed out.

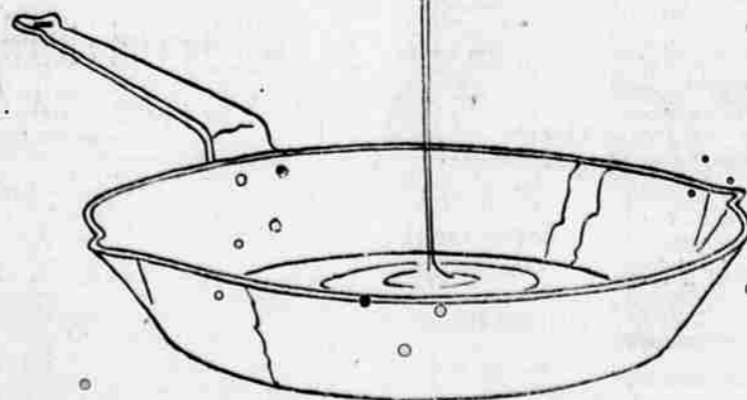
