"Looks as though there will be plenty of steelheads in the Rogue this season," reports Ralph Cowgill of Medford. "Of course, you don't know, but the signs point that way." Preserving the Rogue for sportsmen is one of the hobbies of Mr. Cowgill, and he has been harping on the subject in season and out of season for years. "You'd be surprised," he said yesterday, "how much money is left in this state by visitors who come to fish. In addition to outsiders buying homesteads along the Rogue, they spend money on groceries and other supplies. I know of one family which had a meat bill of \$300 for one month. Yes, they caught plenty of fish, but they like steaks, too, and they like to catch fish on barbless hooks and throw them back into the stream when they have had the fun of landing a steelhead."—The Oregonian.
