

TAYLORS RETURN FROM LONG TRIP BY AUTOMOBILE

Judge and Mrs. Glenn O. Taylor and the parents of Mrs. Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. L. Carlin, arrived home last evening from their long auto trip of about five weeks to Minnesota, Saskatchewan, Canada, North Dakota and other points, during which they covered 3800 miles.

The trip was a delightful one and, despite his 80 years, Mr. Carlin stood it best of the quartet, and Mrs. Carlin, 75, was next in taking a very keen delight. During the journey they encountered quite warm and some cold weather at times.

Much of the time was spent in visiting Mr. and Mrs. Carlin's former home, Hillsboro, and Judge Taylor's former home in Grand Forks county, North Dakota, which he had not visited for 22 years. On the return trip to Medford they spent a day and a half in Yellowstone national park and came via the McKenzie pass from central Oregon.

Judge Taylor took particular interest in visiting Grand Forks and vicinity and his alma mater, the University of North Dakota, which is also the alma mater of John H. Carlin, much of the grounds for

which institution were the gift of Bill Hudge, the well known Medford orchardist, and former state Republican leader and otherwise prominent citizen of North Dakota, until he located in Medford.

The judge today declared without any equivocation that the University of North Dakota is the most beautiful and best laid out, except possibly the University of Washington, in western territory.

The party stayed a little longer than originally intended as the judge says that on account of the advanced age of Mr. and Mrs. Carlin he didn't desire to drive very fast. Then, too, while he did not say so, he disliked to spend in a foreign state, as a news account of a pinch on that charge along the route would look bad in home newspapers.
