

PROHIBITION LAW WEAKENING U. S. MORAL

Rotarians Told 18th Amendment Brought Some Benefits, But Has Undermined Regard for Constitution—Corrupting Honesty.

AMESBURY, Mass., July 18.—(AP)—Representative A. Piatt Andrew, Republican of Gloucester, believes some way other than the eighteenth amendment should be sought to deal with the problem of prohibition.

His concern, he said in an address before a joint meeting of Rotary clubs here last night, was "the eighteenth amendment as it is, not as it might have been had it been possible to carry it out as many in the beginning had hoped."

He said the eighteenth amendment has brought "some very important" benefits, but declared, "it has undermined the people's regard for the basic charter of our institutions. It has impaired their respect for law and government. It is corrupting their standards of straightforward and honest living. It bears upon the poor but not the rich."

Congress Dodged. He praised President Hoover's advocacy of an "organized, searching inquiry" of the subject in his acceptance address two years ago, but congress, he said, "dodged the

issue and authorized a much diluted inquiry into the enforcement of all laws."

In an effort to carry out the president's original proposal, he said, "a letter addressed to the responsible heads of every national organization and committee known to be concerned with prohibition, whether pro or con, bespeaking their support and asking for their opinions and suggestions, brought an amazing and disillusioning response."

"Not a single representative of any of the organizations commonly spoken of as 'dry' expressed anything but hostility to the proposal, and some of them replied in terms of harsh and bitter condemnation that might appropriately have been applied to the projects of a gangster or a racketeer."

ASHLANDERS USE LOTS OF WATER

Ashland water consumption amounts to about six million gallons daily from the Reeder gulch reservoir and Ashland creek and approximately one million gallons daily from the Talent irrigation district, according to City Water Superintendent Earl Hosler.

Mr. Hosler stated that Ashland has used approximately 80 acre feet of the 800 acre feet purchased annually from the Talent irrigation district. The Talent water is short this year, however, and it is likely the full 800 feet will not be available.

Approximately 30 feet of water has been drawn out of Reeder gulch reservoir to date.

Mr. Hosler has been conserving the storage supply as much as possible as the stream flow is about six second feet today and is decreasing daily. By August the draw on the Reeder gulch reservoir will be quite heavy, he stated.—Ashland Tidings.
