ALEXANDER DUFF DIES AT HOME ON JACKSON STREET

Following an illness of several months, Alexander Duff died at his home, 333 East Jackson street, last evening at the age of 82 years, 4 months and 16 days. He was a resident of Medford since 1906, a civil war veteran and a life member of the Medford Elks lodge. Funeral services will be held at the Catholic church next Monday morning at 9 o'clock, with Father Black officiating. Interment will take place in the Jacksonville cemetery.

Deceased came to Medford in 1906, following 30 years' residence in Arizona, where he married Ella Black at Prescott in 1899. He was engaged in the mercantile business. Two sons Robert and Lawrence Duff, both of Medford, were born to this union, and they with Mrs. Duff, survive his loss.

He enlisted in the United States army April 30, 1864, and was honorably discharged in October, 1864. He was a member of Company A, 141st Illinois volunteer infantry. He was a member of the local G. A. R. post and served as vice-commander two terms.
