DOUBLE TEAM CLINCHES RIGHT PLAY FOR CUP

AUTEUIL, France, July 19.—(AP)—America's youthful tennis team today gained the right to challenge the French for the Davis cup, eliminating Italy in the interzone final by sweeping the first three matches.

The crack doubles combination of Wilmer Allison, Austin, Texas, and John Van Ryn, East Orange, N. J., scored the deciding victory, defeating Baron Humbert de Morpurgo and Paolino Godini, 5-7, 6-2, 6-4, 1-6, 6-3, after Allison and Geo. Lott of Chicago had chalked up singles victories.

Lott led de Morpurgo by two sets to one when play was called yesterday on account of darkness and the resumption of the match this afternoon found the blond American in the victor's form.

Lott's victory followed that gained by Wilmer Allison of Austin, Texas, in a thrilling five-set struggle with Giorgio de Stefani yesterday and gave the Americans a clean sweep of the opening singles.

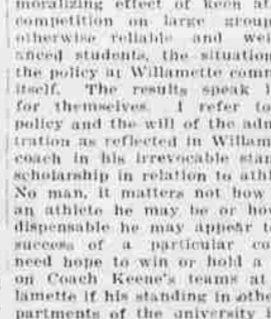
