DON MOE WILL DEFEND TITLE, CHICAGO LINKS

216 Golfers to Compete in Western Meet — Most of Entrants Young — Oregon Youth Not Favorite.

CHICAGO, July 19.—(AP)—Two hundred and sixteen golfers, most of them comparative youngsters with rising hopes, unpack their way bags Monday in a drive for the 31st Western Amateur championship over the Beverly Country club course, where Chick Evans won the western open in 1919.

It will be one of the youngest fields in the championship's history. Even the defending champion, Donald K. Moe, Portland, Ore., is barely out of his teens.

But what the veterans lack in quantity they more than make up in quality. Among them were such capable shotmakers as Chick Evans who has held virtually every title on this side of the Atlantic during his more than 20 years of golfing. Cyril Tolley, and T. Phillip Perkins, formerly amateur champions of Great Britain; Bob McCarty of Des Moines, trans-Mississippi champion, and Ruddy Knepper, Chicago.

Moe, apparently far off the great game he displayed in the Walker cup matches and during the 1929 championship, ranked anything but a favorite to repeat in the week's grind. The smart field of youngsters was led by Johnny Goodman, Omaha, the calm sinewy-muscled shotmaker who toppled Bobby Jones in the national amateur at Pebble Beach last fall.

Goodman finished among the money winners in the national open at Interlachen this month, despite one bad round and appeared to be on top of his game as never before.

LARKSPUR SCORES EASY WIN FROM GLASSY ENTRANTS

ARLINGTON PARK, Chicago, July 19.—(AP)—Big Larkspur, 1929 three-year-old champion of America, galloped to easy victory over a select field of five in the Arlington cup with \$25,000 added, before 30,000 sweltering racing fans at Arlington park today.

The brown four-year-old son of Black Servant—Blossom Time captured the race prize by three and one-half lengths, with Pete Wrack second and Toro third.

Stan Benn was fourth and the Frisky acting Revellie Boy, surprise winner of the \$50,000 American derby, the only three-year-old to accept the issue, finished fifth, trailing in last place.

SECOND BANTAM COURSE OPENED

Medford's second midget golf course, established here by R. Fell of Santa Barbara, Calif., was opened to the public last night on North Riverside avenue near Fifth street with a large crowd of players attempting to equal the course's par of 29 for 18 holes. It will be open daily and is expected to draw many golf fans.

Concrete and felt are used in its construction, with the former for a base, the later for a surface. Novel hazards are a feature of the holes. Mr. Fell has arranged for ample space for parking cars at small charge and announces that rates of 30 cents for adults and 20 cents for children under 15 years will be charged. He is also establishing a lunch concession and will soon have rest rooms available.

Four electric lights of 1000 watts each are used to light the course, giving ample illumination for night playing. A fountain, to be illuminated with colored lights at night, is also being installed.

For a time this season the leading two battens in both major leagues belonged to Philadelphia clubs.

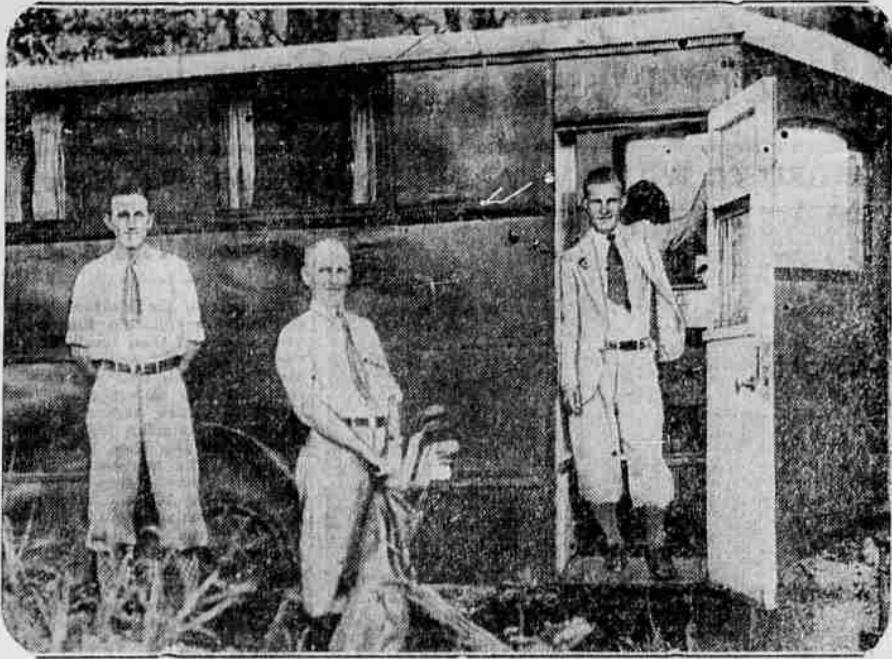
George Von Elm, of the Walker Cup team, is one of the wealthiest of the country's prominent amateur golfers.

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YANK NET AGES DOWN ITALIANS IN DAVIS SERIES

AUTEUIL, France, July 19.—(AP)—America overcame a fighting Italian tennis team today to enter the challenge round for the Davis cup. Adding two more victories to the one achieved yesterday in the opening match of the inter-zone final, the United States forces chalked up the three victories necessary to clinch the series. Tomorrow's two singles cannot affect the result and the Americans will clash with the French for the trophy here next Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

As usual however, the Italians upset all the locker room gossip. Baron Humbert de Morpurgo, whom many hereabouts had believed might win from George Lott of the United States in a last minute shift of the doubles lineup and gave the crack American combination of John Van Ryn, East Orange, N. J., and Wilmer Allison, Austin, Texas, one of the hardest tussles they have had in many a day. The match provided some brilliant but spotty tennis and ended with the Americans winning 5-7, 6-2, 6-4, 1-6, 6-3.

SHAMROCK V. ON WAY TO AMERICA BESET BY STORM

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., July 19.—(AP)—The Shamrock V, Sir Thomas Lipton's latest challenger for the America's cup started on her voyage across the Atlantic today to the accompaniment of cheers by a vast crowd and serenade of ship's ahoy, but was held up by stormy conditions.

The craft, on which Sir Thomas has pinned his hopes to achieve his ambition of capturing the famous cup, tonight was anchored in the spithead roadstead sheltered from a stiff blow and a turbulent sea and with her was Sir Thomas' steam yacht Erin, which will lead her across the ocean.

Late tonight the Shamrock V was taken in tow by the Erin and moved from Ryde roads up the spithead roadstead toward Cowes, where the yacht races are annually held. The westerly wind was greatly abated and the water much calmer.

During the night the Shamrock will remain under the lee of the Isle of Wight and in the morning if weather reports are favorable she will set sail again with the Erin.
