D. A. R.'s to Place Markers, Northern Oregon, July 27th

Musical Program is Enjoyed By Radio Fans Tuesday Eve

From the Lewis and Clark chapter, D. A. R. of Eugene comes an invitation to members of Crater Lake Chapter and all others interested, to join them Sunday, July 29 and Sunday, July 27 in erecting markers along the old territorial road.

These caravans will leave the Producers Public market in Eugene at nine o'clock each Sunday morning.

Today the west side will be marked beginning at Moon rock where the old road branches off the Pacific highway to go south. The second marker will be placed at Smithfield near the site of the Daniel Smith home which was established there in 1852. From this point the caravan goes to the old D. B. Carrington home built in the Lorane district in 1853. This house was known as the Mountain House hotel.

Sunday, July 27, another caravan goes to Coburg to mark the road and the old ferry, now known as Spore's Ferry, where the road turns east another marker will be placed to mark the place where the early settlers turned off to go to the Hulins Miller home, the birthplace of Joaquin Miller, the poet of the "Sierras" and another marker will be erected at this old home too.

The fourth marker is to be placed at the Mitchell Wilkins home. After a picnic luncheon two other markers are to be placed. One near the Osage Orange bridge. In the early days settlers sent to England for seed to plant. These same hedges which were used instead of fences. The last marker will be placed at West Point to designate the historic boundary between Linn and Lane counties.

These markers are iron posts set in a cement base and are from five and a half to six feet high. Metal plates 12 by 18 inches with necessary data are placed on top of these iron posts.

Maurice Graham, veteran among courageous air mail pilots, crashed and lay unburied for 24 months in the mountains of western Utah. He was lost in a blizzard.

Last night another pilot, Fred Kelly, of the Western Air Express, carried Graham's ashes along the route that Graham used to fly, scattering the ashes as he went. Interesting idea, easily understood. Our bodies and the ashes they leave in the crematory return interest us.

But where is Graham? Where is the courage that carried him so far through the blizzard, over the Kaharra mountains? When asked that question 1,000,000 years ago, they will still be asking it \$1,000, 000 years hence.

In the far east the ground is shaken by earthquake "from Rangoon to Mandalay," and the young whose petticoat was yellow while her little cap was green, had things more important than British soldiers to think about. Villages were shaken, houses collapsed, many killed.
