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

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FISH LAKE WATER AT LOWEST EBB

Water in Fish lake is at a very low stage, according to news received this morning at Jackson County Game Protective association headquarters. The water at the towers is now only six inches deep. The Game Protective association is endeavoring to have the state game commission immediately install adequate fish screens at the outlet of the lake.

These have been needed for several years. It was pointed out this morning and officers of the local association believe the screens will be placed soon.

Water in the lake reached a similar line in 1924 and 1925, at which times the Medford irrigation district was unable to deliver water.

TYPHOID RESULT APPLIGATE SWIM

Four cases of typhoid fever in the city of Medford were reported today by the city health officer, Dr. L. D. Inskeep. All are believed to have originated outside of Medford and two are attributed to either drinking water from, or swimming in the Appligate river.

One case of infantile paralysis on South 1st, two cases of tuberculosis and one of German measles were also reported today by Dr. Inskeep.
