

MEALS FOR FOUR COST \$13.72 WK.

Budget Based On Current Prices Shows Staples far Below 1929 Level—Research Bulletin Shows Proper Food Outlay.

CHICAGO, July 22.—(AP)—A family of four may eat well this summer for \$13.72 a week, according to a summer food budget based on current prices, made public today by the American research foundation.

"An average of \$13.72 a week spent for food will provide the family of four with all the nutritional elements necessary to physical well-being and yield interesting summer meals," asserts a bulletin from the foundation.

"Many staples are from 20 to 40 per cent below their 1929 level, while fresh fruits and vegetables offer chances to trim tidy sums off the food budget." The budget provides:

Vegetables, including cabbage, tomatoes, spinach, radishes, lima beans, peas, celery, asparagus and onions, to cost \$1.32. Fruits, including peaches, apples, pineapples, bananas, rhubarb and dried apricots, costing 78 cents.

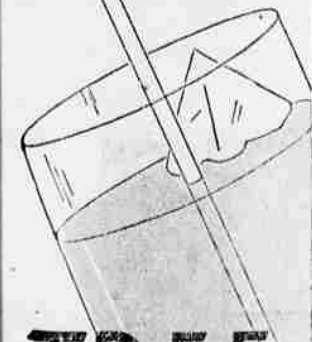
Meats, including pork, bacon, lamb chops, ham and beef, costing \$2.77. Butter two pounds, one dollar. Canned goods, including soups, tuna fish, fish, salmon and grapefruit, \$1.35. Dairy items, including cream, milk and eggs, \$3.28.

The housewife is urged by the foundation to buy in as large quantities as possible and to watch newspaper advertisements closely.

CRIME SEEN AS CAPRICE OF GLANDS

Law Enforcement Commission Told Misbehaving Human Glands Often Accompanied By Abnormal Behavior.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—A new way of reasoning the why of crime has been laid before President Hoover's law enforcement commission by a young San Francisco physician who believes the day will come when it will be generally accepted the chief factor in all human misbehavior lies in chemical or physical malformation of men's bodies.

Dr. Ralph A. Reynolds, the physician, gave his findings from extensive investigation in San Quentin prison, California, to Chairman Wickersham and Commissioner Anderson, in charge of the inquiry into cases of crime.

Although the results are far from conclusive enough to back up a dogmatic theory, he said, they had convinced him exhaustion of the field is warranted.

"This is not a theory," he explained, "it is an interpretation, a line of reasoning more scientific, I believe, than the prevalent practice of merely punishing or merely pitying criminals."

"Here is a girl 41 years old," he exemplified, "who, because of a dysfunctioning gland, has developed all the physical and instinctive characteristics normally attained in 18 years. She has the problems of 18 years and the experience and knowledge of but 11 years. Is it any wonder she gets into trouble? Yet, if we did not know her physical defect, we would only condemn or pity her for moral turpitude."

With the cooperation of Dr. L. Stanley, the prison physician, Reynolds examined and compiled cards of statistics about 200 criminals in San Quentin, all of whom had easily recognized glandular dysfunctions.

Thyroid Often Cause. Some of them were thyroid cases, suffering from wrong secretion from a horseshoe-shaped structure in the throat which often causes great nervousness. Others were pituitary patients, belonging to that group of physically abnormal individuals among whom obesity, when pronounced, often is accompanied by excessive growth in adolescence and a definite easy going "good natured fat" personality.

The rest had disturbances of the reproductive system—a field where many cases still are dim to scientists—a field in which, it is acknowledged, malfunction means abnormal behavior.

"I found a trend of unity, a relationship between thyroid trouble and crimes of violence such as murder and assault," said Reynolds. "I found it between pituitary disturbances and crimes of responsibility such as robbery and thieving, and between the other dysfunctions and acts as moral turpitude."

The percentage of abnormal gland conditions is about 40 per cent higher among prisoners than among law-abiding population, Reynolds concluded from his study.

OREGON PEARLS IN NEW YORK FAVOR

Fifty-seven per cent of all the pears used in New York during the first half of the current year originated in Oregon. A new record for volume was established as the receipts of Oregon pears in actual number of cars was the heaviest ever known, totaling 684 cars for the half year against 608 cars for the same period a year ago.

Pears comprised more than two-thirds of all the Oregon fruit and vegetable shipments to New York for the January-June period, as total receipts were 901 cars. Because of the lighter apple crop last season the movement of apples was smaller than a year ago, which tended to reduce the total receipts. A year ago, for the same period, the total receipts were 943 cars, this being the record for the period. Two years ago only 722 cars arrived in this period.—Oregonian.

POLICE FIRE UPON RIOTERS IN CAIRO

CAIRO, Egypt, July 22.—(AP)—One rioter was killed and 87 injured, 27 seriously, by gunfire and missiles during severe rioting climaxing the political situation here today.

There was much damage to property while looting, civil police and excited students by thousands struggled for the upper hand along the principal streets of Cairo. In one thoroughfare hardly a window remained unbroken in the showers of stones and other objects hurled by the rioters. The troops were obliged to use their rifles freely.

TOWNSEND KAYOS MEDILL IN FIRST

LOS ANGELES, July 22.—(AP)—Billy Townsend, hard-hitting Vancouver, B. C. junior welterweight, today is more than even with Joey Medill, box fighter from Chicago. Digging a convincing sleep punch from his bag after he had bounced Medill off the floor three times for nine counts in a minute and a half, the Canadian put away his middle western opponent for good in the first round of a scheduled 10-rounder here last night. Recently Medill took a 10-round decision over Townsend.

Ants Repulsed In White House By Pill Box Plan



Set athwart the line of travel, a pill box trap (right in sketch) exterminated little red ants (left in sketch) common to American pantries when they attacked the White House.

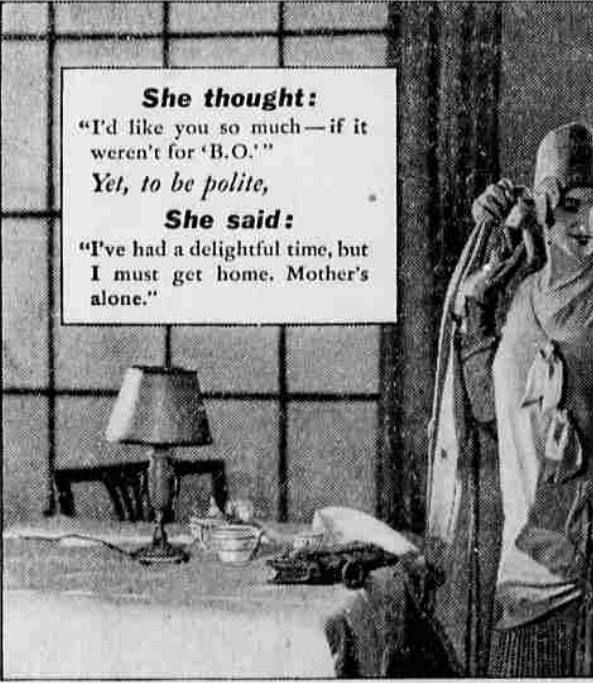
WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The President's kitchen is protected by a pill box.

A very simple sort of trap, it is the only thing two departments of agriculture specialists found effective against the little red (Pharaoh's) ants that infested the White House.

Called in when White House ant-taches were unable to suppress the outbreak, R. T. Cotton and W. G. Ellington, entomologists, tried every scientific repellent and then began the pill box experiment which has resulted in a simple and effective ant trap for household use.

They took an ordinary round pill box, washed the interior with a solution of hot paraffin to make it water tight, and removed four small sections from the inner wall by the syrup while it is being prepared, should not be breathed.

Set athwart the ants' line of travel, the boxes will wipe out an infestation in a few days. Ants

FARMER HEARS FATAL PLUNGE OF MAIL PILOT

Finds Plane Crumpled in Field at Early Morning Hour—Fog and Rain Believed Cause.

HURON, O., July 22.—(AP)—William Frederick Martin, 26, of Bay City, Mich., flying the air mail from Cleveland to Pontiac, Mich., for the Thompson Aeronautical corporation was killed instantly early today when his Pitcairn plane crashed two miles west of here.

The crash is believed to have occurred about 4:30 a. m. The plane fell on the farm of George Hearty, who said he heard a crash at that hour but disregarded it. An hour later when he went into the field he discovered the plane. It was crumpled as if it had been squeezed between two huge hands. There was no blaze and no odor of gasoline. The pilot's parachute was in its pack. The body was crushed in the cockpit.

Jack Parker, manager of the Parker air field at Sandusky, said he believed Martin had pumped his gasoline as he felt, to prevent the mail from burning.

Fog and rain is believed to have caused the accident.

CONSTABLE RUNS AMUCK IN HONGKONG STATION

HONG KONG, July 22.—(AP)—An Indian constable ran amuck in a police station last night, forced his way into an armory, seized a rifle and killed the wife of the British sergeant in charge of the station and an Indian Sikh guarding the entrance. He was later killed by fellow police.
