EAGLE POINTERS ASK COUNTY FOR IMPROVED ROAD

Routine and road matters occupied the attention of the county court at the regular session today. A delegation of citizens from the Eagle Point district called and asked that a stretch of road connecting with the Meridian road be graded ere winter comes. It was taken under the usual advisement.

Report of E. M. Wilson on his audit of the county books, shows that since January 1, 284 marriage licenses have been issued in this county since the first of the year. A slight error was discovered. One of the licenses was listed as a dog license. It was corrected.

There has apparently been a decrease in the dog population. This year 866 licenses were issued, with receipts \$1839. Last year 1273 licenses were issued, receipts \$771.

The prohibition fund contains \$4,073.69, with no warrants outstanding against the same.

It will please Calvin Coolidge's millions of admirers to know that, regardless of weather, he always wakes up smiling. He inherited and served through the period of gigantic prosperity, caused by the pouring out of war billions. Then he handed the job to Mr. Hoover.

And now for writing 150 words a day, telling Mr. Hoover to keep cheerful and the people to support him, Mr. Coolidge is paid \$150,000 a year, at least twice what the people pay to Mr. Hoover to worry. What wise words: "I do not choose."

Egypt, "oldest civilization in the world," except perhaps Mesopotamia, acts through the anger of the mob just as savage nations act. Incidentally rioters seek out leaks in the gas mains, set fire to the leaks and blow up mains, destroy many houses.

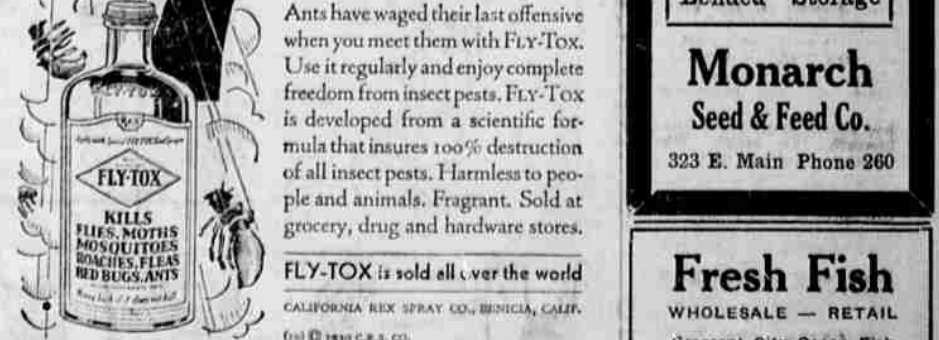
