COAST SCHOONER LONG OVERDUE MARSHFIELD

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—Fear was expressed in shipping circles today that disaster may have overtaken the coast steam schooner Tiverton, now 72 hours overdue here. The freighter in command of Captain A. Madsen with a crew of sixteen, left Eureka for Coos bay Saturday afternoon and should have reached here Sunday morning.

No word has been received nor has any trace of the vessel been seen by other ships. The weather has been calm and clear during the week.

CHIMPANZEE WORTH \$100,000 IS DEAD

COLUMBUS, O., July 23.—(AP)—Joe Mendl, the chimpanzee that wore clothing, and was said to be the highest paid animal of his kind on the stage, died last night at the home of his owner, Loui Baekenstoe, here. Baekenstoe said he recently had rejected an offer of \$35,000 for Joe. It was reported here that the chimpanzee was insured for \$100,000.

GENERAL MOTORS EARNINGS SHRINK

NEW YORK, July 23.—(AP)—General Motors corporation in the second quarter this year earned \$1.17 a common share, compared with \$2.01 for the like period last year, and 92 cents a share in the first quarter this year.

In addition, the corporation has a non-recurring, non-recurring profit of \$9,517,943 from the sale of 1,375,000 shares of General Motors common to General Motors Management corporation, which was equivalent to 17 cents a common share, making the total net for the second quarter equal to \$1.34 a common share.

TEXANS ROUSED AGAINST BLACKS

MARSHALL, Texas, July 23.—(AP)—An armed posse combed the countryside around Greenwood, La., east of here today in search of two negroes who shot and killed C. J. Mason, 40, Greenwood merchant, and fled after robbing his wife.

Sheriff T. R. Hughes of Caddo parish at Shreveport said from 500 to 600 men were engaged in the search and "no telling what would happen if the negroes are caught."

STANLEY MYERS ASKS DISMISSAL

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—Stanley Myers, district attorney of Multnomah county, today filed answer in circuit court denying generally all allegations brought against him in the divorce complaint filed by his wife, Lettie Myers. His answer declared his wife is "a devoted mother and a diligent person to care for the four minor children." He asked a decree of dismissal.

Mrs. Myers' complaint charged her husband with cruelty.

UMPQUA VETCH CO-OP PLANNED BY GROWERS

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—Formation of a co-operative association of purple vetch growers of the Umpqua valley was suggested today by R. J. Fisher, president of such an organization in Humboldt county, California. He is here studying local conditions.

SCHOONER ARRIVES

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—The steam schooner Tiverton, 75 hours overdue from Eureka, Calif., crossed in at Coos Bay harbor at noon today. Shipping men here had been concerned about her safety.

ASHLAND FIRM TO ERECT PINEHURST SCHOOL BUILDING

Bids on the new \$20,000 school building for the Pinehurst district were opened Monday night, and the lowest bid on the general contract was that of Bailey and Spitzmuller of Ashland, \$10,039, but the board will consider relative bids for several days before awarding the contract. Other bids on the general contract were: Sig Ash of Medford, \$10,900; Fick & Carter of Jacksonville, \$10,821; Frank Jordan of Ashland, \$11,385.

The Provost Hardware company of Ashland was awarded the contract for heating and plumbing on their lowest bid of \$2855. Other bids on heating and plumbing were: Coffeen and Smedley of Medford, \$3250; Modern Heating and Plumbing company of Medford, \$3685; Hawks company of Medford, \$2956; Simpson's Hardware of Ashland, \$3169.

LOWE TO ARRANGE EXHIBIT FOR AREA

Lowe, president of the Western States Exhibitors association, leaves for Crescent City tomorrow to confer with the board of supervisors of Del Norte county and the agricultural commissioner there regarding the northern California and southern Oregon exhibit to be maintained at the Pan-American Reciprocal Trade conference and the California state fair.

After visiting the California port Mr. Lowe will go to Grants Pass, Yreka, Klamath Falls, and Lakeview to obtain information from each place respectively which will be incorporated in the exhibit. He will be accompanied by A. H. Banwell, secretary-manager of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association. The development association, sponsoring the exhibit, has already raised sufficient funds for its maintenance.

Air Pioneer Dies

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 23.—(AP)—Glenn H. Curtiss, widely known aviation pioneer, died this morning in the general hospital here.

Mr. Curtiss was brought to the hospital several days ago from his home at Hammondsport, N. Y., to undergo an operation for appendicitis. The operation was said to have been successful and he was recovering rapidly.

Hospital authorities stated death was due to pulmonary embolism, caused by a blood clot on one of the main arteries leading out of the heart.

WM. LYMAN SUFFERS A MAJOR OPERATION

William Lyman, well known civil war veteran, who has been a patient at the United States veterans' hospital at Portland for some time past, underwent a major operation there Monday, and today was reported to be as well as can be expected. He did not recover consciousness after taking ether at 7 o'clock Monday morning until 7 that afternoon. Mr. Lyman is 86 years old and has been in failing health for months. Mrs. Fred Scheffel, his daughter, is at his bedside.
