Ashland Water Situation

Water consumption in Ashland remains about the same, in the neighborhood of 6,000,000 gallons a day, according to Water Superintendent Earl Hosier. The stream flow is gradually decreasing and as this decreases more water is being used from Reeder Gulch reservoir. Water running through Ashland creek in Tithia park is to supply prior water rights down the creek. This water is sometimes taken from Reeder Gulch reservoir and sometimes from the Taitout irrigation district. Lawns and city parks do not seem to be suffering from the water regulations, the alternate day watering keeping them green in most instances.—Ashland Tidings.
