

MAJ. ECKERSON MAY RECOVER AFTER CRASH

Became Air Sick in Mountains Says Injured Aviator, Explaining Crack-Up En Route East.

BUTTE, Mont., July 24.—(AP)—Major Gilbert H. Eckerson, Portland, Ore., aviator, whose plane crashed into a mountain side near Butte Tuesday, was conceded a good chance to recover from his injuries by attending physicians at a hospital here today.

He is suffering from two small frontal skull fractures and cuts and bruises.

Eckerson was attempting a 24 hour one-stop flight between Portland and New York. He was found strapped in the cockpit of his de-molished plane ten hours after the accident by a farmer's daughter.

Explaining the cause of the accident, Eckerson said: "I got sort of air sick late last night after I got into the mountains flying high. The compass went haywire. I must have lost a lot of altitude and just bumped into one of the hills."

He left Portland at 5 p. m. Tuesday and expected to reach Roosevelt field, New York, last night.

FIRE DEPARTMENT CALLED ON TWICE

Damage estimated at \$200 resulted this forenoon when fire, believed to have been caused by a small gas stove, broke out at the Richfield service station on Sixth street, Franklin George, station attendant, sustained a burned hand when he attempted salvage efforts while the flames were at their height, burning principally some curtains that were used in car-washing operations.

A fire this afternoon summoned the fire department to Chestnut street, near the Brown-inch saw mill, to extinguish flames that were destroying a small family garage.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—(AP)—Secretary Adams said today he had recommended to President Hoover dismissal of two midshipmen who took two girls into the mess hall and dormitory at the Annapolis naval academy.

The students, who Adams declined to name, were Lawrence L. Myatt, of Quincy, Mass., and Miller S. Burgin, of San Antonio, Texas. The midshipmen took the girls, dressed in uniforms, into the dormitory and mess hall about two weeks ago. After the disclosure, students in the second class, of which Myatt and Burgin were members, were restricted to quarters.

MORMONS IN OBSERVANCE CREED BIRTH

PALMYRA, N. Y., July 24.—(AP)—A four-day period of pioneer services in commemoration of the organization of the Church of Latter Day Saints and the 83rd anniversary of the Mormon pioneers' entrance into the valley of Great Salt Lake, began today at the national shrine of Mormonism—the Joseph Smith farm near this village.

On this farm Joseph Smith told his followers 160 years ago he had climbed the hill of Cumorah under heavenly direction and unearthed a volume of gold plates containing the record of a lost American civilization and the tenets of the "true religion."

Two hundred and fifty missionaries and 200 members of the Mormon church from 14 states and Canada have assembled to hear discussion of missionary problems and commemorative addresses and witness a pageant.
