

MEDFORD FAMILY INJURED IN AUTO CRASH IS REPORT

Marion E. Harper, the well known city carrier of the Medford postoffice, and family en route north on his annual vacation, were in a bad automobile wreck last Monday night on the Pacific highway north of Sutherlin, Ore., in which among other injuries, Mrs. Harper's right hip was dislocated, their daughter, Edna's right arm was broken, Mr. Harper and their son, Herbert, were badly bruised and shaken up and their car demolished.

Mrs. Harper and daughter are in the Mercy hospital at Roseburg and will be there for a week or more, according to a letter received in this city from Mr. Harper by the local postoffice staff last night, and much sympathy is expressed by the staff and the many others Medford friends of the family. It is understood that Postmaster Warner is at Roseburg today, seeing that "everything is being done for their comfort."

An account of the accident is contained in the following news item sent out from Sutherlin: "Mrs. M. E. Harper of Medford suffered a dislocation of her right hip and cuts and bruises on her head, and her daughter Edna suffered a fracture of her right arm when a car in which they were proceeding to Portland went off the highway on a sharp curve south of Sutherlin Monday evening and turned over. Mr. Harper and another daughter and son who were in the car, escaped with slight bruises. The injured were given first aid by a local physician and taken to a Roseburg hospital."

SOLONS TOLD OF MINERAL CONFAB AND PORT IMPORT

Letters have been sent to all senators and congressmen of Oregon and California telling of the success of the Mid-Pacific Empire Mineral Economic conference held in Grants Pass July 15, particularly with regard to the importance of Crescent City harbor to mining development in this section, according to officials of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association.

Excerpts from papers given at the conference were contained in the letters showing that those present at the meeting were of the opinion that an adequate harbor at Crescent City would result in the readjustment and lowering of the freight charges, thereby stimulating an interest in mining here. The mining conference also brought out the fact that this section has not been favored with the right kind of publicity regarding its resources and officials of the development association are planning a publicity campaign through-out newspapers and mining magazines of the country to present authentic information and data regarding these resources.

American Girl Starts Health Service for Refugees in Syria



TYPICAL home of Armenian refugees in a village in northern Syria where 40,000 exiles from Turkey are being settled by the League of Nations. Miss Annie E. Slack of Ramsey, N. J. (inset), has started an itinerant medical service for the American Near East Foundation in these refugee villages, where doctors and nurses were unknown. In three months two clinics and one maternity center have been established and large swamps cleared for canalization in the battle against malaria with which 90 per cent of the people are afflicted. Miss Slack has introduced the first "healthmobile" ever seen in Syria. It travels from village to village in charge of a native doctor who collaborates with Miss Slack in her entire health program and will assist in expanding the work.

HUNGARIAN GAME BIRDS THRIVE IN JACKSON COUNTY

They like southern Oregon, Hungarian pheasants do. And they're going to raise their families here. Three of them with 15 chickens each were interviewed by Roy Parr, deputy game warden, yesterday in the foothills out from Ashland. The birds, put out by the state game commission, appear to be well satisfied with conditions here and so do their broods.

The Jackson County Game Protective association hopes to increase the propagation of these birds to such an extent that sportsmen will be allowed to hunt them in the neighboring hills. They anticipate an open season on them before many hunting seasons pass. Gene Simpson, superintendent of the state game farm, has signified to the association that he will send more pheasants down this season and will no doubt do so immediately when he learns how prolific the ones brought to southern Oregon last year have become. The hens and their chicks probably do not know that by their ready adaptation to local circumstances they are adding their name to the list of game birds in this section and will be accordingly spotted by the hunters' gun.

BLAZE KILLS ONE ON DOLLAR LINER

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—(AP)—Fire which started in the engine room of the Dollar liner, President Volk, early last night took the life of one crew member and imperiled seven others before it was extinguished. Damage was nominal, company officials said, and will not prevent the ship's scheduled sailing Friday.

BUTTE, Mont., July 24.—(AP)—The body of Sylvia Hill, 17, was found by Butte authorities today after they had been directed to it by Roy Hendrickson, 22, who confessed he killed her. Hendrickson surrendered voluntarily to the police, saying he had killed his sweetheart because they did not have enough money to get married. The police believe the young man also intended killing himself but lost his nerve.
