

Big Bill Beats Borotra in Opening Davis Cup Challenge

LOTTS DEFEAT PERKINS LOOMS AS SUCCESSOR TO MOE'S TITLE

Veteran Trounces Basque After Turbulent Scene in Third Set—Lott Loses in Straight Sets.

ROLAND GARROS STADIUM, Auteuil, France, July 25.—(AP)—France and the United States wound up the opening day of their 1930 duel for the Davis cup all even in singles victories with one for the challenger and one for the defender.

Henri Cochet, French master, defeated George Lott, of Chicago, in straight sets in the second match of the opening day winning 6-4, 6-2, 6-2.

Cochet's victory gave France, the defender, an even break. Big Bill Tilden, leader of the American forces, conquered Jean Borotra in the opening duel 2-6, 7-5, 6-4, 7-5. After a nervous start, Tilden swept through to his eighth major tournament victory in succession over the bounding Basque. The match was bitterly fought and was featured by a turbulent scene in the third set when Borotra scored a service ace after the American had hit his hand to indicate he was not ready to play. The umpire ruled Tilden had motioned too late and gave the point to Borotra.

Tilden, already rallying mightily after erring frequently in the first set, rose to new heights after the upsetting incident and trounced the Frenchman parading through to the first victory of the challenge round with only the final desperate effort of the Basque in the fourth and deciding set holding him up temporarily. The Basque rallied in the final set after Tilden had run the count to 5-1 in games. The Frenchman needed off four straight games but could not hold the pace and dropped the deciding set 7-5. Once Tilden, favorite to beat the Basque, hit his stride there was no stopping him. His cannonball service need Borotra repeatedly and he ran the Frenchman ragged from baseline to baseline in the third set. Borotra was very tired when the players stopped.

Perkins, now a resident of New York but still a hope of Great Britain amateurs, toured the championship course with a 69, two strokes under par, yesterday to win a dramatic, uphill skirmish in the quarter finals against Jack Westland, Chicago district champion. It was the best score ever carded on the course even though officials refused to accept it as a course record because it was made in match play. But the score and great comeback had its effect and today he was ranked as the man to beat for the title.

Girl Swimmer Needs Only Five World's Marks For Clean Sweep From 100 Yards Up To 1500 Meters



Helene Madison, 17-year-old Seattle high school girl, this year has captured 11 world's swimming records for women. Competing at distances from 100 yards to 1,500 meters, she needs only five intermediate marks for a closed monopoly within the range.

SEATTLE.—(AP)—Five more records and Helene Madison will hold all the world's swimming marks for women from 100 yards to 1,500 meters. The 17-year-old high school girl who is being hailed as the greatest woman swimmer of all time, has only to shatter the 500-yard, 600-meter, 1000-yard, 1000-meter and 1500-meter figures to claim 16 recognized records.

In competition this year, Helene has collected 11 world's marks from 100 yards to a mile. Four of the five she has not yet garnered. The intermediate between her swim speed and her mile endurance drive. Consequently it is regarded as highly probable that when she turns her attention toward them, they too will go her way.

In past record swimming, a sprint performer was one thing and a distance swimmer another. With Helene's one distance seems to look the same as another. Trout thrive best where the daily maximum temperature does not exceed 68 degrees and the temperature variation throughout the day is not too great, according to general opinion of sportsmen. Many people once believed that trout thrived best where the water was coldest, but many fish culturists now deny this theory. Among others, Jan Metzelaar, biologist of Michigan, believes that extreme water temperature has kept many plantings of young trout from maturing. Trout shun water that is either too warm or too cold, and the same holds true for other fish. A suggestion of one way of controlling temperature is to plant a fringe of brush or small trees along the banks of small streams which are barren of cover.
