

GALA NIGHT AT LOCAL AIRPORT FOR BIG DANCE

The big night exhibition and dance at the new Medford airport tonight promises to draw the largest crowd that has visited the new port since its inception. The entire program is sponsored by Medford post No. 15 of the American Legion, as a benefit for the drum corps convention fund and local Legionnaires have been working hard to make it a success. There will be plenty of parking space for the many cars and admission will be free to all.

The night parachute drop which will be put on tonight for the first time in this part of the state, promises to provide a real thrill for the crowds. Bob West will be taken up by Pilot Brown in his Travelair biplane to a point some 2500 feet above the airport, before he jumps into space.

Passenger flights will be made by not only Pilot Brown, but also Pilot Waage in his Curtis Robin plane affording local people a fine opportunity to see Medford's night illumination from the air at a nominal charge.

The new hangar building has been attractively decorated for the occasion with scores of Ameri-

can flags, as well as banners and pennants in the Legion colors, blue and gold.

The floor is in excellent shape and those who have not yet danced on a cement floor have a new pleasure to look forward to. The latest popular dance music will be supplied by Don Provost and his well known "Pop Peddlers," with Sam Carey, versatile entertainer, as master of ceremonies.

Popular admission prices will make it possible for everyone to attend this initial airport dance. Tonight will be the first opportunity for southern Oregon people to see Medford's new \$120,000 airport fully illuminated with the scores of border lights and flood lights, as well as other types of modern airport lighting. This feature in itself is bound to draw many out of town visitors as well as hundreds of local citizens who feel a just pride in Medford's splendid new airport.
