

GIRL FLIER WILL LEAD IN STUNTS

Medford to See Famed Aviatix in Hazardous Loops and Spins at Dedication of Local Port Monday—Rankin Protege.

The headline performer and stunt pilot on the Pacific Northwest Air Tour, which leaves Vancouver, Wash., today and will arrive in Medford, Monday, August 4, is Dorothy Hester, slim 19-year old Portland girl, who has been heralded as "the greatest woman stunt flyer" in this country. She will participate in the program to be sponsored by the Medford Post, American Legion, following arrival of the fleet in this city and preceding the official dedication of Medford's \$120,000 airport, which will take place at 8:00 o'clock on Monday evening under the leadership of the city airport committee.

Miss Hester won her spurs in competitive stunting in the Pacific Northwest when she won first place at the air meet in Kelso over eight of the leading stunt pilots of the district.

She is famous for her upside down flying, outside loops, upside down outside spins and other difficult maneuvers.

Lauded By Lawson

Russell Lawson, tour manager and chairman of the board of directors of the Pacific Northwest Air Tour association, says of her:

"Every pilot in the Pacific Northwest takes off his hat to Miss Dorothy Hester when it comes to stunting and handling an airplane. Without qualification she is the greatest woman stunt flyer ever developed in this country, or any other place. She does everything in the book, upside down flying, outside loops, upside down outside spins, all the conventional stunts and others that you never heard of or saw before. She's wonderful. Twenty thousand spectators at Portland's Rose Festival were amazed at her exhibition; almost that number at Kelso; recently were amazed and eight cracked men stunt pilots were chagrined when she took all honors. She's a wonder."

A year ago Miss Hester was struggling to complete her course in flying in her spare time. She worked hard on the ground at school and three months later she blossomed out as a crack stunt pilot. Tex Rankin of the Rankin school of flying, which she has been attending, noted her aptitude for stunting.

Three months of instruction under the veteran flyer gave her the technique and confidence to do the most dangerous stunts in the list.

Being Over Plane

In this tour she will fly her own plane, a Great Lakes Trainer. All her stunting will be done in this trim craft, powered with a 90 horsepower motor. Her sister will accompany her on the trip.

Five other famous fliers of the Pacific Northwest, who will be piloting airplanes in the tour are: Edith Foltz, one of the seven women in the United States to hold transport licenses; Nick Namor of Spokane, famous for his reeling flight around the country in the "Sun God"; Tex Rankin, famous for cross country dashes; Gordon Mounce, California pilot who recently set a world's record for outside loops with 22 in one flight; and Walter Case, Varney Air Mail pilot, whose blind flying exhibition was recently praised by experts.

CRATER LAKE RIM HAS INFORMATION POST FOR TOURIST

CRATER LAKE, Ore., July 29.—(Sp.)—Due to the appropriate location on the rim of Crater Lake, the building formerly known as Kisor's studio has been turned into an information bureau and henceforth will be known as the information office.

It is the policy of the park that there must be nothing on the rim of the lake that will mar the topography.

In past years people coming into the park have had no way of coming in contact with the rangers and naturalists to learn the stories of the ancient Mt. Mazama and the hidden secrets of Crater Lake, nor have they had any way in which to meet the administrative officers of the park to issue complaints or other comments.

Now park visitors will benefit through the information obtained from the staff of rangers and naturalists who serve daily at this new information office.

The members of the park service have been able to make a greater number of contacts since the opening of the office on July 1 than in any three previous years.

Circulars of general information in all national parks are issued, as well as maps of the park and other government publications.

Flower stands which in previous years have been located on the porch of the community house are now transferred to the entrance of the information office and are advantageously displayed.

MURDER SUSPECT WOUNDS SHERIFF

HILL CITY, Kas., July 29.—(Sp.)—Joyce Blackman, sheriff of Graham county, was shot and seriously wounded early today when he attempted to arrest Alfred (Red) Cummings, wanted on a murder charge at North Platte, Neb.

The sheriff, accompanied by Deputy Richard Odie, approached Cummings and his companion, Floyd Huntington, hearing a state warrant for the former's arrest. Cummings fired, one bullet striking Sheriff Blackman near the heart and another penetrating his arm. As Cummings fled, Deputy Odie fired at him. He was believed to have been wounded in the back.
