PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—(AP)—All grades of butter advanced 1c at the Portland produce exchange today. The price of extras was quoted at 34 and of standards at 33c.

Butter prices followed with an advance ranging from 1c to 2c, the price delivered at Portland being 32c and 33c.

Butter was in brisk demand both from consumers and from retailers.
