

MODERN DAIRY IS OPENED BY JAS. CAMPBELL

Hundred Twenty Cows to Furnish Medford Demand - Local Firms Furnish Fine Equipment.

James Campbell, owner and operator of the new Campbell dairy southeast of this city, has 120 contented cows that line up in their spotless, modern dairy barn daily to produce 300 gallons of milk for families in Medford and the surrounding valley.

The young dairyman is well known in this community, having graduated from the Medford high school, and is a member of one of the oldest families in the Rogue River valley.

Ideally located with a view of the hills and neighboring farms for miles in every direction, the dairy buildings impress those who drive along the highway and those who stop to inspect the modern methods of dairying.

Campbell's 465-acre ranch produces all feed for the cattle and a big spring a mile from the barn furnishes plenty of water for washing purposes.

Sanitary Barn - The barn is 130 feet by 26 feet, with an all-white interior and concrete floor which is kept clean by daily washing.

Adjoining the barn are the room for washing and sterilizing bottles and the room for cooling. The latter is equipped with a Fridgidaire cold box and an aerator device by which milk is cooled before bottling.

MOVIE CRASHERS DAMAGE CEILING AT FOX RIALTO

Leonard Christean and Lowell Lantier, local young boys, wanted to see a free show at the Rialto theatre last night and attempted to make their way into the auditorium. Their efforts resulted in knocking plaster from the ceiling of the show house and causing some disturbance to the audience. The boys appeared at the police station this morning and were to appear there again this afternoon. It is probable no legal steps will be taken against them, but they must repair the damage they caused.

The pair crawled through a trap door on top of the theatre, leading to a space between the ceiling and room. Shortly after they crawled through, one of the boys hit the ceiling too hard and his legs emerged in the showhouse and he would have fallen to the floor except for an electric conduit.

While a few women screamed and most of the audience arose from the seats, there was no panic. A few left the theatre when they heard the noise above them. The city building inspector, F. H. Rogers, inspected the theatre building this forenoon and declared it to be in first class shape and that it was no fault of the building that the plaster fell.

IMPROPER PLATES CAUSE OF ARREST

93,000 REGISTER IN CRATER PARK

By HAZEL REAVIS Associated Press Staff Writer - PARIS, France, July 31.—(AP)—Paris dressmakers, with light lengths and silhouettes set off satisfactorily from the viewings, are having fun in introducing new colors and fabrics.

Winter styles, which are just seeing the light of day, introduce browns, greens, blues, purples and reds which heretofore have been seen only in the paintings of the old masters. Lusterless wool fabrics for day time and rich fabrics for evening, including velvet and metal brocades, crepes and satins, have a color range such as Paris has not seen for many years.

The beauty of the colors is accentuated by extensive use of black and white, both for day and evening.

The new browns have a mixture of plum and garnet red in their makeup. Wine, reds and rich shades of heliotropes and prune are important, while dark greens for day wear and lighter for evening are apparently due for a tremendous vogue.

One house uses the whole color card in sport costumes made of true Scotch tartans bearing the names of the clans.

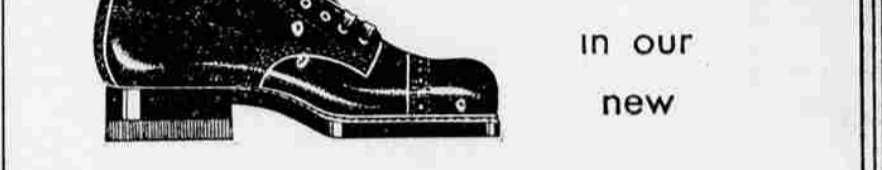

Former Governor Alfred E. Smith, busy erecting a building 102 stories high in New York, ever since he erected his tower of 15,000,000 Democratic votes in 1928, will soon dip back into politics. He will attend the New York state Democratic convention, make some speeches for Governor Roosevelt, whom he nominated in 1928, and take part in the Democratic congressional campaign.

Politicians assume he will be a candidate again in 1932. That would seem reasonable. Bryan had more than one chance, and his biggest vote was only about half of Mr. Smith's. Friends of Mr. Smith, however, predict that he will not run in 1932, but will support and put in nomination his friend, Owen D. Young.

If this happens it will make Republicans thoughtful. New York police, thinking they had discovered the "red nest" from which Russian documents were sent broadcast, raided a drug store belonging to a loyal Tammany man who happened to sell goods to the Russian Amtorg Trading Corporation for its hospital.
