## FIVE KILLED IN CRASH OF AUTO AND GAS TRAIN

Four Escape With Slight Injuries — Bodies Mutilated By Impact On Railroad Crossing.

MANITOWOC, Wis., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Three children and two women were killed today when a gas-electric train on the North-western road hit the touring car in which they were riding. Four other women escaped with slight injuries.

The dead: Mrs. Victor Povalish, 26; Mrs. Frank Mrotek, 39; Marian Mrotek, 2; Gertrude Vandebush, 11, and Martha Vandebush, 12.

Police believe the automobile was being driven to a nearby farm where the women intended to pick peaches.

Several of the bodies were badly mutilated and identification was difficult.

The crossing is four miles south of the city. Visibility is good, and officials were unable to account for the accident.
