

## SERGEANT JONES PASSES IN ARMY HOSPITAL AT S. F.

Sergeant Sam Leo Jones passed away July 31, 1929, at the Letterman General Hospital at the Presidio of San Francisco, at 56 years of age.

Sergeant Jones enlisted in the service of his country Nov. 28, 1895. He served on the American Relief expeditions in 1918 and was the only soldier who served on both of these expeditions, a fact which brought him distinction.

The greater part of his life was spent in service to his country, mainly in Alaska, where he became invaluable to the government because of his experience. He retired from active service Sept. 6, 1916 while stationed at Valdez, Alaska. After visiting his parents at Washougal, Wash., he came with his family to Medford, Ore., Oct. 15, 1915, purchasing his home on Griffin creek, where he resided until he became seriously ill June 29, 1929, although he had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Jones was a man of high ideals and a great lover of music and little children. He leaves many friends throughout the United States and Alaska, both in army circles and civilian life.

He will be laid away with military honors in the beautiful national cemetery at Presidio, Calif.

He leaves his wife and eight children, Thelma, Woodrow, Winifred, Marcella, Lorraine, Beverly Jean, Harris and Mrs. Ralph French, all of Medford.

## 1100 PHEASANTS OUT OF SHELLS AT GAME FARM

There are now 1100 pheasants hatched at the southern Oregon branch of the state game farm located at Rogue Lands north of Medford, members of the Jackson County Game Protective association, who are sponsoring the farm, stated today.

The birds range in size from two-day old balls of striped fluff to replicas of quail, all feathered out and ready to fly. They fly out of the pens each day but still return for feeding time. The sportsmen expect them to desert the domestic life soon to seek their grains in the wilds.

There are 240 eggs still under hatching. They will hatch within the next two days.

All the birds will be turned loose when they have reached an adequate age and will join the game ranks of southern Oregon.
