GREENSPRING MT. ROAD WORK WILL BE FINISHED SOON

Within another month the road building work on the Greenspring mountain highway will be completed, according to Washburn and Hall, contractors, who yesterday moved 30 of their workmen to the Santiam highway, north-west of Bend, where they have been awarded a large road construction contract.

It will take another month to finish the surfacing on the Greenspring highway. Widened, resurfaced and had grades eliminated along with 14 curves, the reconstruction work on the Greenspring highway, when completed, will add a lot of speed to the mountain drive.

All of the blasting, grading and heavy rock surfacing is completed. The work has been in progress for the last year. Without regard for either mountains or gulches, the road has been amazingly straightened. Many temporary approaches, sometimes dusty and rough, but at no time dangerous, have been constructed whenever necessary to keep the road open during the construction period.

Whole mountain sides were blasted away, and some amazingly deep fills were made to carry the new highway as near as possible a straight line.

Further construction work on the Greenspring mountain road is planned. A survey crew has been working for the last year laying out the new route.—Ashland Tidings.
