SEWARD, Alaska, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Bringing word that Aniakchak and Veniamino, two of the least known craters on the Alaska peninsula, hitherto believed dormant, are active and "apparently have recently erupted, the Rev. B. R. Hubbard, known in Europe and America as the "Glacier Priest," arrived here today after three months' exploration in that isolated region. He is head of the geology department, University of Santa Clara.
