FORMER MEDFORD COUPLE DISCOVER ABANDONED CHILD

Of interest to residents of Medford is news that the abandoned baby left in an automobile in Sacramento last Friday was placed in the machine belonging to Mr. and Mrs. F. Leigh Swinson, formerly of this city, and later found by Mrs. Swinson, daughter of Mrs. Rose Elbert of Medford, who reported it to the police department of the Sacramento hospital, where the now five-and-a-half-day-old infant is being cared for.

A letter telling of the story and including a picture of the baby, published in the Sacramento Bee, was sent to Medford by airmail by Billy Barnum, who is visiting his aunt in the southern city.

Billy and all the family are excited about the find and the future of the baby has not been determined. A note was left in the car with him. It read: "Please keep him. I cannot, God bless you."

Mrs. Swinson had left her car parked for a few minutes on a business street when she returned and found the baby in a soiled blanket deposited in the seat. An investigation is being carried on by the police department to determine his identity. So far he is known as "Baby John Doe."

The Swinsons are well known in Medford, where they frequently visit. Mr. Swinson was formerly a member of the Mail Tribune staff.
