## WHEAT PRICE IN CHICAGO SOARS

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(AP)—Active general buying both of corn and wheat, sent prices soaring early today with corn leading the upward flight. The main incentive for purchasing corn was assertions for purchasing corn was assertions of drought and heat has reached an aggregate unparalleled in the history of American crop disasters. Unexpected comparative firmness of Liverpool wheat quotations today, together with adverse crop reports from Canada, tended to lift the wheat market here. Opening unchanged to 1 1/2c higher, corn quickly scored general gains of more than 2c. Wheat started 3-4c off to 1 1/2-3c up, and later showed a decided general advance.
