

MEIER NAMED BY DISSENTERS TO 'CARRY-ON'

Portland Merchant Assumes Mantle and Policies of Joseph — Nominee Expects to Be 'Manager', Not Governor With No Promises or Pledges.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 8.—(AP)—With the nomination last night of Julius L. Meier, Portland merchant, as independent candidate for governor, the Oregon electorate will have three candidates to choose from when they go to the polls to elect a governor in November.

Phil Metchan, Portland, hotel man, was chosen as the Republican candidate at a recent meeting of the state central committee. This was the first time in the history of the state a Republican candidate had been named in that manner and resulted from the death of Senator George W. Joseph, who was nominated in the May primaries. Edward W. Bailey, Junction City, was nominated in the primaries as the Democratic standard bearer.

Senator Joseph was elected on a platform of free speech, municipal and public development of hydro-electric power and the abolition of the public service commission.

When the Republican central committee nominated Metchan, followers of Joseph charged it had "scraped" the platform which won the support of more than 50,000 voters in the primary election and immediately announced they would place an independent candidate in the field. Meier's nomination last night was the outgrowth of that announcement.

Meier, formerly associated with Joseph in a Portland law firm and previous to the Republican state convention had agreed to become a candidate for the nomination. When the state committee failed to endorse the Joseph platform, however, he withdrew from the race. Despite this he received 10 votes in the final ballot on which Metchan was nominated. Metchan polled 29 out of the 35 votes.

Four thousand persons attended the convention last night at which Meier was nominated. More than 2500 of them signed pledges to support a candidate who would carry on the platform enunciated by the late Senator Joseph.

Meier was nominated by an unanimous ballot, cast by the secretary after the 4000 independent voters, without a dissenting vote, had supported a motion calling for such a ballot.

In his acceptance speech Meier said he had no intention of going into politics.

"If elected," he said, "I am not going to Salem as governor, but as a manager of one of the biggest jobs in the United States. I expect to go without promise or pledge, uncontrolled by any political machine."

The Noted Dead

SAN JOSE, Cal., Aug. 8.—(AP)—The hand of death today had ended the career of ex-Senator J. D. Phelan, after an illness which lasted since May of this year.

Surrounded by members of his family, the former senator, who for many years had been an outstanding figure in California political, social and cultural life, lapsed into unconsciousness at 1:30 yesterday afternoon, and died three hours later.

Funeral services will be held Monday morning at St. Ignace church in San Francisco.

Born in San Francisco in 1861, Mr. Phelan at an early age took an interest in politics, and served three terms as mayor of his native city. He was elected to the senate in 1915 on the Democratic ticket.

After his term of office, he retired and devoted himself to cultural activities. He was connected with many banking and business enterprises in California, but found time to devote much energy to public service.

ASHLAND LUMBER PLANT FIRE HIT

ASHLAND, Aug. 8.—(Sp.)—The Moon Lumber company suffered damage of approximately \$20,000 here yesterday afternoon when fire destroyed dry kilns and a large supply of lumber. The Ashland fire department quelled the flames, which for a time threatened the entire plant.

The company had planned to start operating next week after a suspension of activities for the past summer, employing approximately 70 men. The fire may change plans, but it was thought today that the mill and box factory may begin operations as scheduled.

FIRST TRAIN OF BARTLETTS IS SHIPPED EAST

10 Carloads Shipped Out Over Alturas Cut-Off, Due in Chicago in 8 Days—Train a Day Next Week.

Ten carloads of Bartletts—the first train lot of the season—were dispatched last night by local shippers to eastern markets. The fruit will travel via the Alturas Cut-off, and will arrive in Chicago on the eighth auction day. Total car shipments to date, including last night's, are 18 cars.

The first long train of local Bartletts is scheduled to depart Monday night, and a train a day will then be the order for the following week. All packing plants and picking crews will be in full operation then.

Pressure tests conducted by the county agent's office, show the Bartletts now ready for picking.

"Watchful waiting" continues to be the policy with the canneries, with no disposition to raise their first offer of \$25 per ton—the same price as offered in the Yakima district. The rank and file of the growers are holding out for a minimum of \$35 per ton for local Bartletts. Some of the growers, however, have sold their Bartletts at \$30 for eastern shipments, it is said.

There is no labor shortage, with many coming from outside points seeking work. Growers and shippers are giving preference, as far as possible, to home workers.

OWENS PLANS ON FIGHTS IN FALL

It will be another three or four weeks before boxing and wrestling matches will be resumed in Medford, a letter from Herb Owen, promoter, said today. He plans to start off the season with several hot smokers followed with good wrestling matches. The fighters will include such men as Gene O'Grady, Joe Marcus, George Dixon, Mickey Dolan, Eddie Edelman, Willard Norton and others.

In the wrestling division, the old favorite, Bob Kruse, will be back, and perhaps the banner attraction of the season will be a match between Kruse and Ira Dera of Salt Lake City. Dera refused to wrestle Kruse in Portland, but is agreeable to a match in Medford, thinking he will get a square deal here.

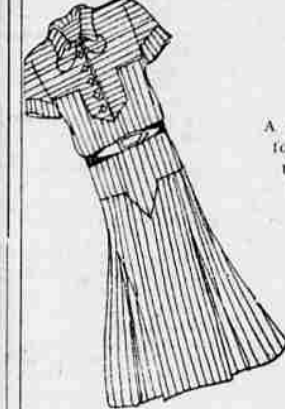

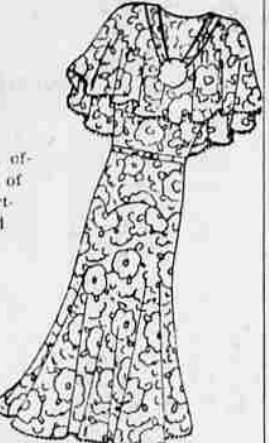

Later he expected to talk over long distance telephone with Alexander Leage, farm board chairman, who is in the west and in direct touch with the situation.

In order that no time may be lost in laying the basis for relief work, the president was considering cancelling his proposed trip to his Virginia mountain lodge today and not leaving until tomorrow.

It was reiterated at the White House that, because of the many conflicting reports, nothing could be done until the report of the department of agriculture is compiled Monday. This is expected to show what aid is needed.

In addition to the measures contemplated by the government, the Red Cross also is ready to take a hand if the report shows a large extent of human suffering.

Weather bureau forecast today gave little prospect for immediate relief from the hot weather.
