ulation of Asia, China especially, and then on the Chinese war.

Of 20,000 Huaneese troops in one China fighting unit, "more than half are boys 14 to 16 years old, only 25 per cent have rifles, the others carrying spears and swords for beheading prisoners."

When war, brigandage and famine bring to the battlefield boys of fourteen armed with beheading swords, you know that Providence, or something, is attending temporarily, to the Asiatic population problem.

Importation of King Carol, persuaded to trade a charming lady for a Balkan throne, has not helped the condition of unfortunate Jews in Roumania.

Constant anti-Semitic outbreaks are reported. The latest telling of Roumanian "students" boarding trains, and beating Jewish passengers. The outrages are stimulated by distribution of printed matter, urging attacks on Jews as responsible for all misfortune, from too much rain to drought.

Various Roumanian organizations are formed for the purpose of Jew-baiting. One is called "The Iron Guard" (another "The Archangel Michael Student Organization"). Its namesake would not be proud of it.

The League of Nations tries to have the anti-Semitic organizations suppressed without success.

Railroad terminals in New York seek some plan of delivering that will enable them to deliver goods at "store doors." For a reasonable price.

Some plan is needed. It costs less to ship goods across the Atlantic ocean than to deliver them after they reach New York. This writer sent from Los Angeles a carload of furniture of mahogany grown in the Philippines. It cost less to ship the furniture from the Los Angeles factory to the harbor, down the coast, through the Panama canal and up to New York than it did to send it from the New York dock to destination.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—Six men who hope to bring back to England from America the Westchester Polo Cup after the international matches in September left here today. They sail from Southampton later today aboard the Aquitania.

## DETROIT KILLER FLEEING BY AIR AND SEA, NABBED

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Wanted in Detroit for a suspect in the murder of Terry Buckley, radio announcer, Ted Pezzoni, arrested here today just a few hours before he planned to sail for his native Italy.

Pezoni was captured as he walked into a bank where police allege he was to withdraw \$15,000 sent him from Detroit to enable him to take a midnight liner for Italy.

John Hoffman, detective lieutenant of Detroit, brought about Pezzoni's capture. He said he learned Pezzoni had moved to New York and his money had been withdrawn at Detroit and sent to a bank in the Bronx.

## TROOPS PATROL MARION TO BALK NEW MOB FRENZY

MARION, Ind., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Anticipating a crisis in the town that has gripped Marion since Thursday when a frenzied mob avenged the murder of a white youth and a criminal assault upon his fiancée by lynching two negroes on the lawn of the Grant county courthouse, state militia-men patrolled the streets tonight with loaded rifles and fixed bayonets.

Meanwhile a board of inquiry, composed of state and county officials had taken steps to prosecute and convict those responsible for the dual hanging. The officials met today and prepared to bring prosecutions under state law which provides the death penalty for any one convicted of lynching taken an active part in a lynching.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Richard Evelyn Byrd, conqueror of the ends of the earth, was linked with the great Virginians of the past and officially placed beside great Americans of the present when he was welcomed today to Monticello as "Thomas Jefferson Guest."

On the lawn of the stately Jefferson Mansion, the explorer was hailed as the nation's hero by President Edwin A. Alderman, representing the old dominion; Gov. O. Max Gardner of North Carolina, representing the south; Harold G. Campbell, superintendent of New York City high schools, and Joseph Miller Jr., of New York, of the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation. Stuart G. Giboney, president of the foundation, presided.

Dick Byrd was the second Thomas Jefferson guest. Thomas A. Edison was the first.

## FRENZIED FATHER PLANNED MURDER OF CRIPPLED SON

WAUSAU, Wis., Aug. 9.—(AP)—A father who had planned to kill and bury his crippled son in a grave scooped out with his hands, was taken today to the state hospital for the insane.

Charles Meronk told the county judge today he was prompted by desperation for money to feed his eight motherless children.

His wife had died a month ago. A son, 6, had fallen from a tree and broken an arm. There was no money to pay a doctor.

The injured boy called for his mother incessantly. Meronk decided to kill him, he told the court. Three nights straight he took him to a cemetery in the town of Galloway, to prepare him for death. Neighbors called police.

Beside a newly dug grave two feet in depth, which Meronk had scooped out with his hands, they found him resting from his efforts. As officers came up, the boy stirred, awakening from sleep, and asked:

"Papa, why don't you shoot me? I'm so tired; I want to go to mamma?"

Meronk told his story in court yesterday. It was his plan after

burying the boy to kill himself. Although he failed the children will be cared for. Charitable organizations have taken charge of them.
