SPEEDING DANGER FINED AND LOSES DRIVING RIGHTS

FINAL HARVESTING OF HUCKLEBERRIES

Two speeders returning home late Saturday night from rural dances came to grief today in the city court, one of them furnishing great excitement on the Pacific highway and at the same time gave Herbert Moore, traffic officer, who was trying to catch him, the ride of his life.

Al M. Proebstfeld, 18, of Medford, was the latter culprit. With several companions in his Ford car he left Jackson Hot Springs about midnight for Medford, and when about a mile away he passed Traffic Officer Moore, who was traveling in his Ford about 35 miles an hour in the same direction, he was flying along at a speed of 65 to 70 miles an hour.

Immediately the officer gave chase and the speed battle between the Ford was on. Endeavoring the best he could to overtake the speeding car the traffic cop was only able to keep the tail light of the other car in view until Proebstfeld on reaching the business section of Medford slowed up. The officer then placed him under arrest.

Proebstfeld, who fairly flew through Ta-ent and Phoenix, claims he slowed down a little on reaching that section of the highway where shoulders are being added to it, but Officer Moore says that if he did the speed at which he passed over this narrow roadway was such that the officer could not tell the difference.

While on his wild flight Proebstfeld, who was fined \$25 and had his driving license suspended for six months in Judge Taylor's court this morning, overtook and passed nine cars and met three cars coming in the opposite direction.

The other speeder fined was Harry Harse of Bend, who drew a fine of \$10 in Judge Taylor's court, because of speeding his car on the Jacksonville highway, and cutting in and passing near cars. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Louis Jennings.
