LEGGE FAVORS GOVT. AID FOR OREGON FLAX

Chairman of Farm Board Visits Senator McNary at Marion County Farm — Delighted With Rural Oregon — Leaves for North.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Keen interest in the Oregon flax industry which, he said, is entitled to the same consideration from the federal farm board as other crops when operated on a co-operative basis, was shown by Alexander Legge, chairman of the board, who was a guest yesterday for several hours at the farm home of Senator Charles L. McNary.

Legge appeared to enjoy thoroughly his visit to the McNary home, which was spent entirely in rest, no official business being discussed. Accompanying Legge were J. C. Ainsworth, president of the United States National bank of Portland; W. D. B. Dodson, manager of the Portland chamber of commerce; Niles Olsen of the federal department of agriculture; John H. Burdard, chairman of the Portland dock commission; Federal Judge John H. McNary, brother of the senator, and several others.

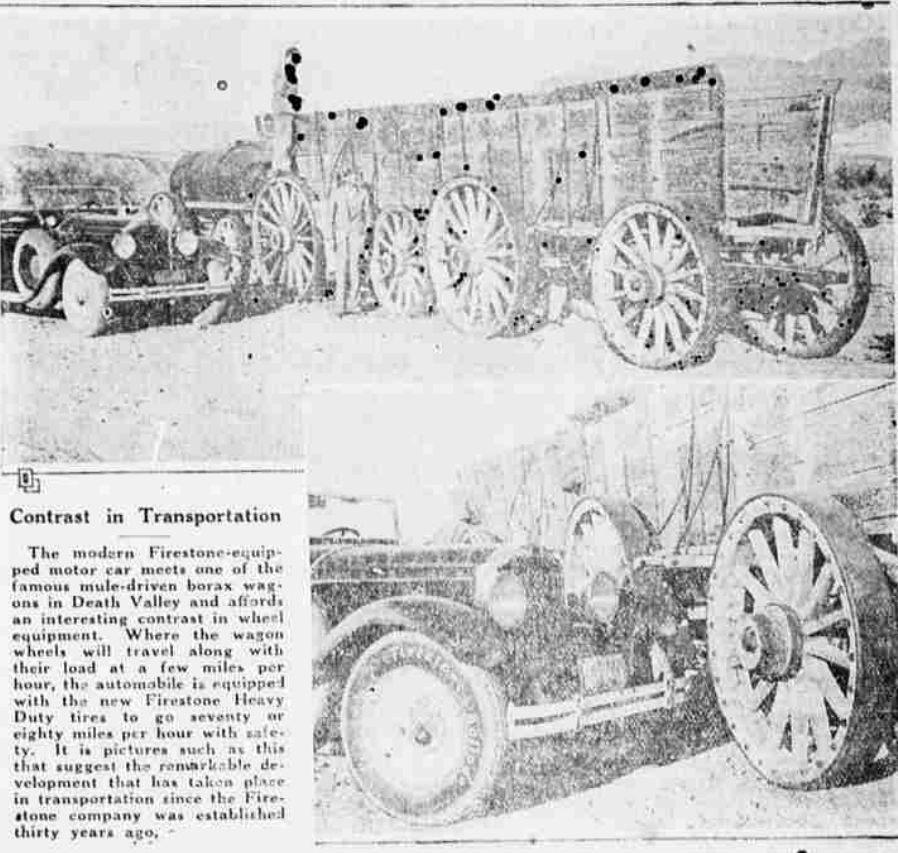
