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Pioneer Film Coming to Craterian

In April, 1830, the first wagon train left St. Louis for the Oregon country.

Early this year congress authorized national commemoration of this epoch and President Hoover issued a proclamation calling upon the American people to observe this important event.

The first concrete response to the president's proclamation came from Raoul Walsh, Fox Film director, advising the nation's chief executive that during April, 1930, he would start production of "The Big Trail," the most important picture ever produced, and upon its completion would dedicate it to the memory of the pioneers who, one hundred years ago, braved the dangers and hardships of the trail to the west.

"The Big Trail" is based on Hal G. Evans' story, and features John Wayne, Marguerite Churchill, El Brendel, Tully Marshall, Tyrone Power and David Rollins. Over 20,000 players were employed in the making of this super spectacle. In filming this production the company traveled 4500 miles to various locations within the boundaries of seven western states and Yellowstone Park.
